\$2,000 for town hall door

There's a bargain waiting for town council, Heritage Acton's Ted Tyler said Monday night.

He said the town has the option to applied for by Heritage Acton in the buy back the new, improved Acton Town Hall for \$1, the same price it sold the building to Heritage Acton for back

Monday night, council approved the application by Heritage Acton for a grant of \$2,000 from the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture.

The money is to replace the front doors to the town hall, refurbishing the

door, frame and trim. The Ministry grant covers hald the

costs with the rest to be made up by Heritage Acton. This is the third Ministry grant

amount of \$2,000. Back in 1983, the group wanted the money to reinforce steel beams for the first and second floors of the Willow Street building. Then, in 1984, the grant was used to reinforce the second floor

ceiling and main roof trusses. Coun. Peter Norton said \$2,000 seemed like an awful lot of money to do the front doors, to which Mr. Tyler. replied it costs more to do old doors than new ones.

Asked if a New Year's Eve party was to be held at the town hall this year, Mr. Tyler said not likely.

"The council and budget commit- ." tee-should consider their options for the Town Hall. The only-ill the hall has could be cured with an injection of cash. The after effects will be all pleasant," he said, pointing out the hall can raise revenue for the town.

"With co-operation like that, you may get Heritage Acton to help you with the Stone School. A little help will help go a long way," Mr. Tyler finished.

6½ hour day irks councillor

The daily grind of 6.5 hours work a day by a full-time regional employee wasn't enough for Oakville Coun. John

Graham. When did the region allow an hour for lunch? That's the first time I've encountered an hour for lunch as part of the work time," Coun. Graham said at last week's administration and finance committee meeting.

The region's chief administrative officer Dennis Perlin reassured the former Halton board of education employee that an hour for lunch was "pretty standard in municipal servic-

The committee was looking at the work week of a property appraiser who works from 8:30 to 4:30 p.m., less an hour for lunch and two 15 minute

breaks for coffee.

The work week was included as part of a report saying the workload for property appraisers have increased, so that with the regional staff available it was only possible to complete 60 appraisals of 110 needed for 1965.

"I guess people work generally fewer hours than we used to," the retired councillor said, shaking his

Burlington Mayor Roly Bird jumped on the bandwagon, asking if that was what Hallon was getting out of each of its staff?

"Department heads work a hell of a lot more hours," Mr. Perlin said. "Quite frankly, I'd be ashamed of myself if I worked that little, 32 hours a week," Mayor Bird said.

Enterac meets condition to start the ball rolling

The one outstanding condition to draft approval for Enterac Property Corporation was approved by town council Monday night.

After a lengthy discussion, council voted to allow the developer of lands south of Silver Creek to proceed with the first phase of the residential development before an agreement is worked out with the town over what happens to the environmentally sensitive valley lands. Most of the most valuable valley lands are on the west side.

It's only prior to proceeding with phase two of the proposed subdivision that concept plans meeting council's approval must be settled for those lands. Designated "open space" by the town's zoning, the future use and ownership of these valley lands haven't been resolved by the town and the developer despite discussions, town administrator Ken Richardson said.

· "It is obvious that Enterac is not prepared to relinquish these lands to a public authority when the future long term use has not been determined. At the same time, Enterac acknowledges that they also have not had prepared any possible long term concept plans," Mr. Richardson reported. Concept plans looking at the use of these lands are to be the responsibility

of Enterac and to be prepared at the corporation's expense. The town will have input into the plans and will have a final say on them. "In fairness, the town hasn't finalized its plans for the valley lands," Mr.

Richardson acknowledged. At the time the town made its lengthy list of conditions for draft plan

approval, there was no talk of phasing in the residential subdivisions in Georgetown South, Mr. Richardson explained to councillors. This change, approved by council Monday night allows for phase one to go

ahead so that the entire subdivision won't be held up. Mr. Richardson warned councillors that if the condition wasn't enacted Monday night, the region would be unable to give draft plan approval Wednesday (today).


