# Senior Rebels endure tough basketball defeats

The Georgetown District High School senior boys basketball team dropped two heartbreakers this week.

The Rebels lost a 49-47 contest Thursday to Oakville-Trafalgar then dropped a 61-58 decision Friday to Perdue. Wednesday Georgetown fell behind 14-4 to White Oaks in the first quarter and dropped a 53-42 game. All three contests were played at the Georgetown gym. To date the Rebels are 1-4 after their first five games.

Wednesday the team hosted a White Oaks squad it had beaten in the initial game of the year for both teams. However, the poor first half, coupled with a less than spectacular second period left Georgetown 15 points behind at the halfway point. Even though the Rebels won the second half, their deficit was too much to make up.

Thursday Georgetown led O-T by nine at the half, but were outplayed 13-2 in the third frame, and had to take the two-point loss despite again winning the final quarter.

Friday Georgetown had ample chances to win as late in the game the Rebels took intentional fouls in order to get the ball back. The strategy worked as Perdue made but one foul shot, and Georgetown had four layups where the

ball would roll around the rim and continue on out.

"It's incredible," said Rebels' coach Bovin Clark. "Three of our four losses this year have been by one or two hoops."

"If you've watched the games without having looked at the score, you'd think we would have won," he said.

The biggest enemy that has faced the Rebels since the season has started has been time. There hasn't been any.

For instance this week the team played on three consecutive nights, thus leaving no time for any practices. "The hardest thing is we haven't had any time to recover from one loss and prepare for the next game," Clark said. "We haven't had time to develop any strategy and our basics have fallen just short because we haven't had the time to work on them."

"We've been there by a hoop or two and it's just a time thing," Clark said.

The Rebels' schedule doesn't get any easier either. Yesterday the team travelled to T.A. Blakelock and Thursday they host Q.E. Park in a big triple header at the Georgetown gym.

No scorers for the games were available.

## Junior Rebels get lesson in humility

The Georgetown District High School junior boys basketball team got a lesson in humility Friday.

The team, which had come off two big wins prior, had to struggle for a 37-32 win over Acton Redmen. Rebels' coach Rick Redshaw said his club felt good about its first two wins: too good.

"We had two pretty good wins prior and the kids thought they were pretty good," Redshaw said. "We came out flat. Acton was playing well and we were terrible."

After both teams ended the half tied at 22, Redshaw switched from a zone defence to a man setup. The Rebels were able to jump out to an eight point lead midway through the third period and settle down for the win.

Wednesday, the Rebels extended their record to 2-0 with a 68-52 win over Loyola there. The Georgetown team

was able to get the early jump on their opponents then play their type of game defensively.

"I like to get the kids moving," Redshaw said. "I like using a man defence to get the fast break going, get a lead then settle back in a zone defence."

Wednesday the Rebels led by almost 20 points at the half. Redshaw then made player substitutions, but the new players were playing as well as his Rebel starters, and Loyola couldn't make up any ground.

"Everyone played well," Redshaw said.

## Parents looking for soccer reassurance

Parents of about 1,000 youngsters who play soccer in Georgetown want reassurance from the Town there'll be properly maintained soccer fields for games and practices.

A signed petition saying just that was submitted to the Town back in September, and last week, it came up at council.

Education fields or leased from local companies with acreage to spare.

The Town has lost fields for playing as a result of a couple of company expansions recently, Mr. Shepard said.

"I think they'd like assurance we had more town owned soccer fields they could count on from year to year," he explained.

Councillors voted to refer the petition to the budget committee for consideration. Recreation director Tom Shepard said there were some problems with scheduling soccer games because the Georgetown District High School field couldn't be used this year as it wasn't considered safe for playing.

As a result, flag football games were moved to the Irwin Dorsey field which then had to be shared with the soccer players, Mr. Shepard told council.

Although there are about 20 soccer fields in Halton Hills, the Town only owns five, the recreation director said. The remainder are either Board of

Coun. Lillias Bowman said she had been at the soccer game where the petition was initiated. She said the condition of the fields sparked the petition rather than the lack of them.

"At this game, the understanding I had was it was the maintenance of the fields people were not pleased with and not that there was one less soccer field this year," Coun. Bowman said.

Most of the parents felt the fields were too dangerous for their children to play on, she said.

Soccer fan Alex Tough agreed that the condition of the fields initiated the petition. He said however, the Georgetown Soccer Club had congratulated the Town's public works department for improved maintenance on the fields this year as compared to past years.
