Therapist heads Halton sexual abuse program

Mr. Paul Bennett has been appointed to the position of Co-ordinator of the Halton Sexual Abuse Program by the Halton Child Abuse Council. He officially assumed his duties Nov. 1.

Mr. Bennett has been affiliated with 'COHR' Family Services in Burlington as a therapist for the past 3 1/2 years. Previously to that he had served in the Departments of Psychiatry, Joseph Brant Hospital and McMaster Medical Centre. He holds his degrees in social work from McMaster University.

As a therapist, Mr. Bennett works with individuals, couples and families who seek help with a variety of problems. He has played an important role over the past 2 1/2 years in the establishment of a region-wide, comprehensive treatment program for individuals and families involved in some form of sexual abuse.

Mr. Bennett says that there is a strong need for a greater commitment to the program from existing community agencies and services. "We need more professionals involved in the program, particularly to run the various treatment groups, so that those who have been participating since the program's inception can share the load."

A few weeks ago Gretchen Day, whose watercolours of flowers, fruits and vegetables I greatly admire, wrote a column in this space (under the Halton Hills Arts Council Logo) headlined "Learn to be discriminating art buyers."

I must confess that I was very pleased with her column because she made an attempt to tackle the enormously troublesome problem of signed and numbered reproductions which are selling - in galleries that sell reproductions - under the euphemism "Limited Edition Prints".

When the editor of the Herald asked me to write a column for the Arts Council Space, to give Gretchen Day some time to prepare herself for the festive season ahead of us, I decided to enlarge some more on the question of

reproductions and their value as works of art.

The "value" of a work of art is before any monetary value it might also possess, an aesthetic value.

If a work of art does not possess any aesthetic value it is, by definition, not a work of art.

How does one detect aesthetic value? First of all you need an aesthetic sense or an "eye for art" (and in the case of music you need an ear). You are born with an aesthetic sense. Only through the most rigorous training can you acquire it, if at all. And even if you are born with an "eye for art", (or an "ear for music") you will still have to train and to tune this eye in order to eventually have the kind of instrument at your command that will enable you to detect the aesthetic value in a painting, for instance, or a building, or, why not, in the design of your car.

The discriminating art buyer is able to weigh the aesthetic value of the work of art he or she is looking at.

November busy for firefighters

November was a busy month for firefighters with 24 calls for service, according to the monthly activity report submitted by Fire Chief Bill Cunningham to town council.

One firefighter and one member of the public were injured and damages tallied \$44,794 in the month. Last November, there were no injuries and fire damages were only \$5,000.

Already this year, there is almost twice as much fire damage as last

year. Figures show fire damages of \$727,459 for 1985 compared to \$365,510 last year. There have been no fatalities either year.
