Harrison steaming along

After three years as a Georgetown Gemini, Blake Harrison felt it was time for a change so he joined Milton Steamers. After all, in his three years he played in the Central Ontario Junior "B" league Harrison had seen Milton win its share of games and the team always finished fairly well in the final standings.

But the Georgetown native didn't bargain for this much change in just 30 games.

Internal problems have led to the resignation of coach Gary Hudson (replaced by former Gem coach Bob Smoulders) and the mentioning of some names as possible trade material. Subsequently, the Steamers are in ninth place in the nine-team circuit, two points behind Nobleton and 11 points behind the Geminis for eighth and seventh spot respectively in the standings. Although Milton has played three less games than Nobleton and two games less than Georgetown as of last Friday.

But through it all Harrison is quietly enjoying his most productive Junior "B" season. Last year he finished with 11 points, but with 18 games left to play the 57, 158-pound defenceman has two goals and 13 assists and is setting his sights on a 20-point season.

Harrison said the Steamers' plight looked respectable after their first 11 games. The team was at 5-6, and things were going pretty well.



However, defencemen (and Georgetown native) Brian Arthur was benched and never returned to the club shortly after and was released. That was when the Steamers' problems seemed to begin, and the team has struggled ever since.

"At the start of the year I was hoping we'd finish higher than Georgetown in the standings," Harrison said, "But now we're going to have to catch Nobleton and if we do we'll likely meet Streetsville in the playoffs."

Even a change in coaching staff doesn't seem to have helped. When newcomer Smoulders came in, he said there would be changes, and at one practice he sent two Junior "B" carded players to Milton's juvenile team. Team captain Tim Poulin talked to Smoulders on the team's behalf, and it is rumored that he too is on the trading block. He hasn't played since that talk.

While Harrison isn't happy with Milton's inability to get back on the winning track, he is pleased with his season. The Steamers are using four defencemen and that means Harrison is seeing a lot more playing time.

A major reason Harrison elected to go to Milton was for more playing time. He said he wasn't sure where he stood with the club after last year.

"Last year I was the last player: signed, and I had to miss the first regular season game," Harrison said. "I wasn't sure where I stood with the team and after three years I felt I needed a change.

"So far (in Milton) I'm getting more ice time and management is happy with how I've been playing," he said.

Flamboro dampens Raiders' X-mas

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders were to have played Saturday night in Chatham, but that game was cancelled. The reason being Chatham couldn't get enough players to ice a team.

"We can't get enough players for the game (Saturday)," said Chatham president Bill Stobbs early Saturday morning. "We've got five players injured, three are away for Christmas and our affiliate team is playing tonight (Saturday)."
