First quarter adjustment paces midget Rebels past O-T

The Georgetown District High School midget boys basketball team made a nice recovery Friday, getting back on to the winning track after suffering a defeat two days earlier.

The Rebels defeated Oakville-Trafalgar 51-33 after having been beaten in Milton Wednesday afternoon by the Mustangs 40-30. Coach Moe Leeking won't be over put the blame on a specific item for the turnaround, but he did say several players were sick Wednesday, and that he went with a depleted team in the Milton game.

"We couldn't play an up-tempo game because we were sick," he said. "Milton had a disciplined defence, but didn't have the depth. That will be something for us to look at when we play them next."

Mark Murnaghan led the way offensively despite only playing a little more than a half due to a back injury.

He had 13 points. Leeking said Phil Rehberg and Sean Cotton, although they didn't dominate the team's scoring, played well in other roles.

"Sean is my sixth man and plays good defence," he said. "Phil was sick before Christmas, but improves a lot in practice and got a lot of rebounds."

Friday the Rebels went out to a 10-2 advantage before O-T made an adjustment and inserted a 3rd court press. The result was a much closer game at the end of the quarter as Georgetown led 15-12. But Leeking made his adjustment and the Rebels were able to easily break the press, and led 26-16 at the half, and increased their margin to 18 once the game ended. Murnaghan had 15 points while Andreas Schirm had 13 points and Jamie Brear had 12 points. The win lifts the Rebels to a 5-2 mark, which ties them with Perdue in the standings.

Flyers end with 1-1 tie

From the opening faceoff the North Halton Sports Flyers stormed to the attack in order to repeat their previous meeting against Burlington in which they defeated their opponents by a wide margin.

It became clear early in the game that a substantial territorial advantage in play doesn't always guarantee the outcome or fate in any game. After a number of missed opportunities the Flyers' Duane Eriker took a Cory Evans pass and fired the puck into the net. Unfortunately it was disallowed as a Georgetown player was in the goal crease.

Doug Sheppard, eluding the opposition behind their net, maneuvered in front and rang one of at least three Flyers' shots off the post. Burlington re-grouped momentarily and in the second period scored the opening goal. North Halton fought back as Blaine McCauley slipped the puck past the goalie on a goal-mouth scramble. Evans assisted.

The Flyers dominated the third period with solid performances by Mike Kotsos, Dave Bouskill, Jamie Stephenson and Steve Ousprifjenko, but the game ended in a 1-1 tie.
