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Georgetown native reaches 1,000 game mark

Lewis achieves NHL officiating milestone

Herald Sports Editor PHILADELPHIA-Georgetown's . Bryan Lewis has joined a very select group of National Hockey League (NHL) officials.

Wednesday in Montreal the 43year-old became only the third man ever to officiate 1,000 NHL games . (Bruce Hood and Ron Wicks have achieved that milestone). Lewis was honored at The Forum prior to the start of the Montreal Canadiens-Winnipeg Jets game and was accompanied at centre ice by his family.

Lewis was presented with a soapstone carving prior to the game while his wife Elaine was given a bouquet of roses. After at the hotel, the gifts continued to come as champagne and a cheese tray awaited the Lewis' return. . Among the many congratulatory telegrams Lewis received was one from Georgetown Hockey Heritage Council , president Dave Kentner.

"I knew the league had something planned, but it was really a lot bigger than I thought it would be," Lewis said from Philadelphia Friday where he was scheduled to referee the Flyers-Islanders game that night. "It really didn't hit me until I walked into the officials' room (before the game) and saw the gifts and champagne. I was somewhat taken back to see all the

Lewis began his professional officiating career in 1967, working in the minor leagues. However Lewis' first ever pro game was in the NHL when he worked as a linesman in Pittsburgh, Lewis' first NHL assignment as a referee came on Jan. 6, 1970 when he handled the Montreal-L.A. Kings game in Montreal, Ironically Lewis' first playoff game was also played in Montreal.

"When I first started I wouldn't have thought that I'd still be here 19

years later," Lewis said. "The history of this business isn't one of longevity. "When you consider the great officials who have come and gone, I'm

In all his years as an official, Lewis can find only one drawback to his job. When hockey season starts Lewis finds himself on the road a lot, leaving wife Elaine home to manage things.

"The hardest part is walking out the door and saying I'll be back in 10 days or so," Lewis said. "My greatest fear is someday realizing I have three kids and that I've missed their growing

"But that's the beauty of living in a small town. People know when I'm not home and bang they come over and help. It's the total cooperation of so many people," he said.

Lewis was to have been honored in December for the 1,000 accomplishment, but was sidelined with a broken wrist. It has just been recently that he returned to action.

"I still have a cost, but I can operate with it. The biggest inconvenience is travelling because I can't use

both hands to carry luggage," he said. Having reached the 1,000 milestone. Lewis will return to the normal activities of an NHL official.


"Now I'll take it one game at a time. I'll approach the games like I did the first 999.

"My goal now is to complete 20 years of officiating with the NHL," he said. "If 21 should come around, that's a bonus. If I could put in 20, then Bryan Lewis would be a very happy individu-

"Even though the NHL sometimes could stand for "No Home Life", it's a great way of life and I've met a lot of great people. It's hard for me to knock something that's treated me so well," Lewis said.

Having had just the one night to celebrate the occasion with his family and get an understanding of what he's accomplished, Lewis said after returning home he'll likely appreciate the congratulatory wishes of people like John Ferguson (GM Winnipeg), Jacques Demers (coach St. Louis Blues) et all a lot more.

"The toughest part," Lewis said with a chuckle, "will be writing all those thank-you notes."


