

Coaching helps Goldham says

Kids now have advantage

When Bob Goldham was a youngster in Georgetown there wasn't a minor hockey association present. Much of what Goldham learned came as the result of trial by error.

"I don't think I learned the technical parts of hockey until after I turned pro," Goldham said. "We did get a certain amount of coaching, but not to the extent of what kids get now."

It's for that reason Goldham looks favorably to the formation of a minor hockey association. Goldham says young players now have somewhat of an advantage than he did back in the 1930's.

"Kids now have a definite advantage in terms of coaching if they choose to accept it," Goldham said. "Their advantage now is they're learning all the basics we took for granted. It (association in the 30's) would have helped. Isn't it a lot easier to learn from someone else's mistake rather than by the hard way?"

But still Goldham sees some benefits from having learned hockey in his day. "With all the coaching the kids get maybe they're all clones. Maybe they do everything the same. What we did learn by ourselves by playing shinny was how to skate and puck handle. Kids today get all this coaching but they don't get the chance to develop

their individual skills," he said.

Goldham, who played on five Stanley Cup winners during his pro career with Toronto Maple Leafs, Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Red Wings, said coaches should aim at keeping the game fun. Goldham said that worked for him as a pro in Detroit.

"We used to look forward to the 15-minute scrimmage after practice for the beer," he said. "If you have an hour practice give 45 minutes for fundamentals and leave the last 15 minutes for a scrimmage. You'll find the kids will look forward to the end of the practice."

Even when it comes to coaching Goldham said setting one's sights on play in the defensive zone will benefit the players more than concentrating on play in the offensive zone.

"If kids get good coaching in their own zone they've got it made. All kids want to go for the offensive zone, but that will develop on its own. It's not what you do with the puck, rather what you do without it," Goldham said.

Goldham also said hockey is slowly coming around to the coaching philosophies that have been part of other sports for quite a long time.

"You look at baseball and football and they've had a lot of coaches," he said. "I think hockey is the slowest sport in developing coaching methods."

Now even when you look at a minor team they've got two coaches and for it to be successful you have to go that way.

"If you have one coach and he sees something the player is doing wrong, he might never get a chance to tell the player because with the time he has he might forget. With two coaches, one can tell the player what he did wrong as soon as he comes off the ice," Goldham said.

"I think when children are 13 and 14 years old that's the time to start developing them. Up to that time they'll develop themselves into where they want to go. If a guy knows what he's cut out to be he's easier to coach," Goldham said.

Even when it comes to coaching Goldham said setting one's sights on play in the defensive zone will benefit the players more than concentrating on play in the offensive zone.

"If kids get good coaching in their own zone they've got it made. All kids want to go for the offensive zone, but that will develop on its own. It's not what you do with the puck, rather what you do without it," Goldham said.

Ski league starting up
