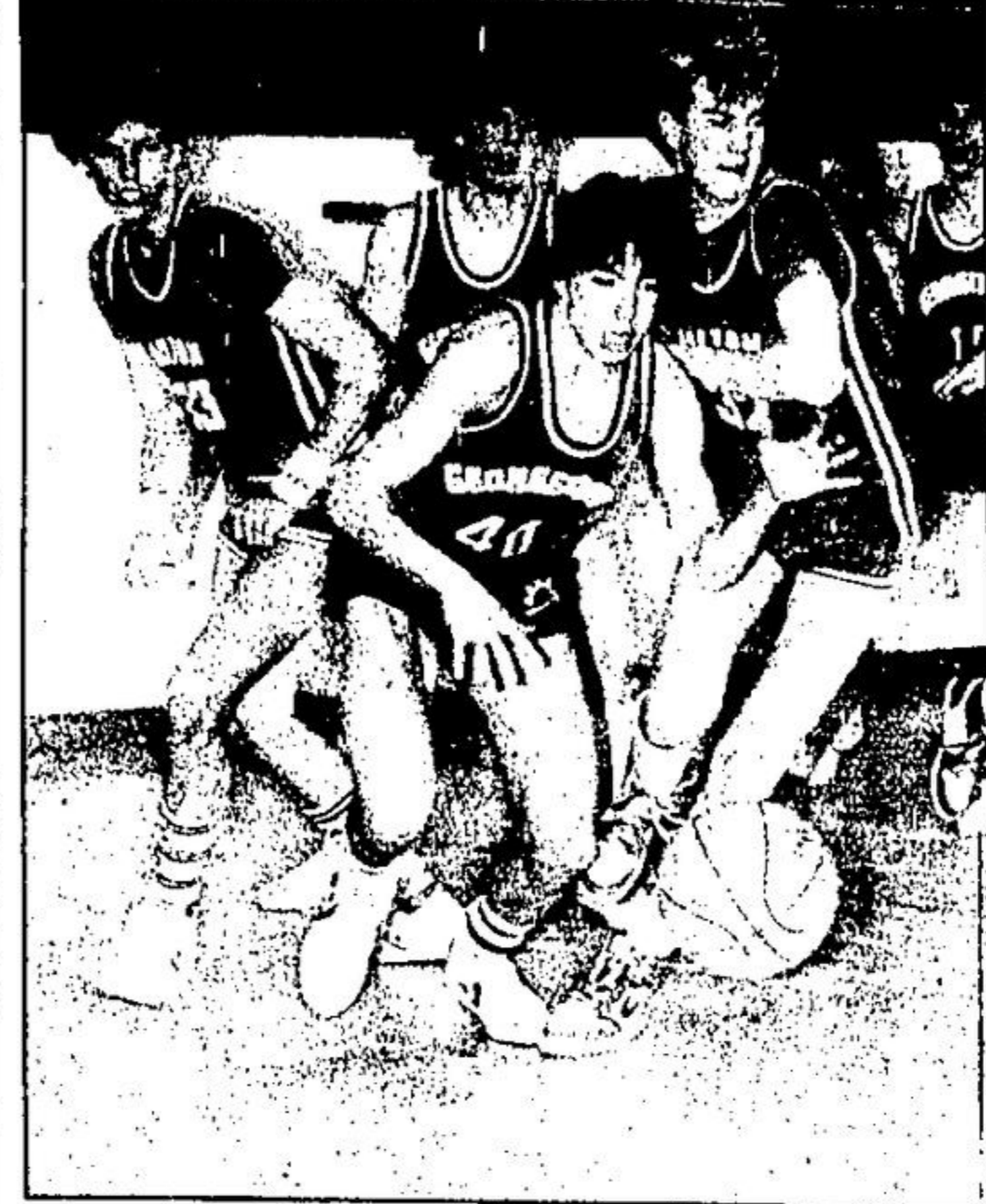

Free throws pace Rebels

A pair of John Watts free throws with just 28 seconds to play lifted the Georgetown District High School junior boys basketball team past Milton 49-48.

The free throws capped an entertaining contest played Friday at the Georgetown gym. Even after the Rebels went ahead Milton held last shot, and with just three seconds left to play the Mustangs' attempted winning try missed and the Rebels had the win.

However, some 36 seconds earlier the Rebels' plight wasn't as good as Milton took a 48-47 on a Georgetown turnover. What made the turnover more crucial was Rebels' acting coach Moe Leeking had been yelling for a time out seconds before, but no player had heard Leeking and while the coach was calling for the time out the turnover occurred.

Milton played catchup the entire game, trailing the Rebels 14-9 after the first quarter and 27-17 at the half. However, Milton tied the game 31-31 after the third quarter, and were in the game the rest of the way.

"I commend Milton for their comeback," Leeking said after the game. "I also credit our kids for sucking it up. It certainly was a 12-man effort tonight."

The Rebels' bench was instrumental in the victory. Starter Rob Jickling fouled out in the third quarter while many other front-line players like Watts played with four personal fouls. That allowed second teamers like Frank Katsilieris to come on and make

a definite contribution. Katsilieris had nine points and was strong on both the offensive and defensive boards.

"I think Frank had a career day in terms of his leadership," Leeking said. "I also think Watts was more of a point guard in the sense that he didn't try to do it all by himself. It was a good team effort. I feel these kids can play."

The win evened the Rebels' record at 6-6 with one game left. Wednesday the team dropped a 57-38 decision to Queen Elizabeth Park there. Friday the Rebels play White Oaks, and a win there would put the team into the league playoffs, as a host of the first round game. The top six qualify, and now the Rebels are in fifth spot.

Midgets defeat Mustangs

The Georgetown District High School midget boys basketball team took a big step towards a possible third place finish in the league standings Friday afternoon.

The Rebels defeated Milton Mustangs 41-30 at the Georgetown gym for their eighth win of the season. However, more importantly the win lifted the Rebels into a tie for third with Milton, and with one game remaining if the Rebels defeat White Oaks Friday they would end the regular season in third spot.

Friday the two teams played a tight three quarters as the Rebels led 18-14 at the half and 22-20 after the third period. After a minute and a half into the fourth quarter the Rebels led by three points thanks to a three-point play by guard Chris Stoddard. Soon after the Rebels got the fast break going and opened a 13-point lead before settling for the 11-point victory.

"I don't think we were cold in as much as it was a slow game," Rebels' coach Moe Leeking said. "The game wasn't won or lost on the fast break. We got it going at some good times, but we had to play a slow game because of all their (Milton) systems."

Andreas Schirm led the Rebels with 14 points, including six in the final frame. Guard Stoddard chipped in with nine points, including seven in the final quarter.

Leeking said he was pleased with his club's play on defence in shutting down Milton's attack. Leeking said Milton averages about 50 points a game, with two players scoring about 20 points each. Friday the Rebels were able to contain Milton's scoring threats.

"I was happy with our discipline on defence and our triangle on their two," Leeking said.

The win also proved the Rebels can beat a good team which also pleased the Georgetown coach.

"It was a good win," Leeking said. "It was nice for us to beat a good club. We've been losing to the good clubs."

Wednesday the Rebels dropped a 47-34 decision to Queen Elizabeth Park there. Schirm had 11 points while Stoddard had 10. Friday the Rebels will play White Oaks in their final game of the regular season.
