HOW VALUABLE IS AN EDUCATION?

"Why do we go to school?" Benjamin Franklin once said. "If a man empties his purse into his head, no man can take it away from him; an investment in knowledge always pays the best interest."

Barber Mill

Plan for boutiques, hotel

A public meeting is expected to be held shortly on an application to amend zoning on the historic Barber Mill property in Georgetown.

Deputy Planning Director Bruce McLean has recommended a public meeting be held and a formal ratification of his recommendation is expected at Tuesday night's council meeting.

Anne and Robert Kreutzer want Georgetown's zoning bylaw for part of Lots 10 and 11, Con. 10 amended to allow redevelopment of the Barber Mill site south of River Drive.

The couple want to develop the site by the Credit River into a multi-purpose complex which would include uses as convention and banquet facilities, hotel rooms, commercial boutiques, dining and lounge areas and associated recreational and staff facilities.

They want to rehabilitate and expand the existing buildings which are about 74,500 square feet to house a commercial complex with boutiques (about 2,750 square feet), 66

hotel rooms, conference rooms (about 6,000 square feet), a swimming pool and exercise room (about 15,230 square feet), and servicing and staff facilities (about 21,040 square feet).

The town's planning report indicates these areas are to be located within the two existing structures on the property with further developments to be phased in, in three stages.

Designated industrial for the most part in the town's 1982 Official Plan, the mill property also has areas designated "Major Open Space", "Rural", and "Residential".

The Halton boards of education, the Ministry of the Environment, Bell Canada, the Recreation and Parks Department, Union Gas and Halton Hills Hydro all have no objections to the development application.

It wants to map the surficial geology of the Brampton map area which includes portions of the Town of Halton Hills. In order to do this, it needs to drill a series of boreholes for subsurface information at Lot 11 Con. 5, Fifth Line, south of Regional Road 15; Lot 14 Con. 5, Fifth Line south of Regional Road 15, and Lot 10, Con. 11, Regional Road 19, south of Sideroad 10.

Concern for Park pupils may result in crossing

A school crossing area, with white lines and appropriate signs has been recommended by Halton Regional Police for Charles and Mill Streets in Georgetown.

If a reassessment of the crossing in October finds students using it to go to Park Public School have increased, it will be considered for a crossing guard.

Councillors are expected to endorse the police report at their meeting Tuesday, March 11.

According to Const. Bill Phipps, in a study Jan. 29, about 60 youngsters crossed at this location on their way to and from school that morning. He notes there is no sidewalk on the east side of Charles Street between Church Street and Remembrance Park.

"How effective is a crossing without a crossing guard, since we're talking about safety?" Coun. Gerald Henne demanded Monday night in general committee meeting.

Town engineer Bob Austin replied that drivers tend to be more careful when they see school crossing signs.

Police did a pedestrian and vehicle count in their report and also took note of vehicle speed in the area. Coun. Lillian Bowman wanted to know who will decide when there are enough children to warrant hiring a crossing guard at the intersection. Mr. Austin said Const. Phipps

will monitor the intersection and when he feels it to be necessary will recommend a crossing guard.

"If the Halton Hills Consolidation Study goes ahead as planned, there will be more children going through to Park School so I would hope this is monitored, especially in the winter time when the snow is bad and the children walk on the road," Coun. Betty Fisher said.

Coun. Pam Sheldon objected, saying council shouldn't be making plans based on what might or might not happen regarding the Consolidation Study. "I don't think we should be sitting around here assuming consolidation takes place. We don't know if that will take place," she said.
