New Halton troupe perform Pied Piper

Students of dance and drama in Halton have formed a Halton Performing Arts Co., and will be presenting an Evening of Dance and Drama March 7, at the John Elliott Theatre at 8 p.m.

Rehearsing since October, the company will be performing "The Pied Piper of Hamelin", choreographed by Jill Evans and Deirdre O'Higgins, and a suite of dances called Close Harmony choreographed by Yvonne Oldaker. A dramatic presentation of "The Five Children and It" has been directed by Kathleen West.

The company was formed to give students the chance to work on a production involving students from schools other than their own and to work with different choreographers.

The ballets in particular were designed to give the children an example of two types of ballet. A story ballet with costumes, scenery, props, etc. in which everyone has an important part to play in creating three dimensional pictures onstage, and an abstract ballet, also in costume but where a theme as opposed to a tangible story is evident.

Everyone has given their time on a volunteer basis, and willing parents have worked long and hard, making scenery, props, and costumes to ensure their children have the best possible support system to be able to perform to the best of their ability.



In a very neat, political maneuver, the Council of the Town of Halton Hills shifted the responsibility of a Town Arts Policy back to the Arts Council by stating that a 'needs' study would have to be done before any further consideration would be made.

This study is now well underway by the Arts Council. But it needn't look too far for an indication of growing enjoyment and need in the community for more good arts entertainment.

Globe Production's Li'l Abner sold 95 per cent of its tickets. Georgetown Little Theatre's The Mousetrap followed suit with almost every night a sold out performance. Within hours of the local papers hitting the streets, the extensively advertised 'Evita' was sold out on Friday and Saturday nights with accompanying waiting lists and with only a few tickets left for Thursday.

It is too bad that two weekends weren't reserved for Evita by the Recreation and Parks Department considering its popular run in Toronto, coupled with the enthusiasm for good theatre generated by Globe and

But, there has been no consistency or overall plan of action in its distribution of tax dollars to the arts community at large. With increased awareness and enjoyment of the Arts, along with an ever growing community, such an Arts Plan or Policy is a must

The Town Council is fearful that an Arts Policy could incur greater costs in the future, and there is that possibility. But, it is better to anticipate these costs and plan for them in advance than to randomly hand out money in the present ad hoc, short term, casual manner.

As Art Eggleton, Mayor of the City of Toronto, states, "The Arts are not a cost to the community, but an investment - not a luxury, but a necessity."
