All three place finishers won awards, the YBC seniors obtained trophies while the Masters got cash awards.

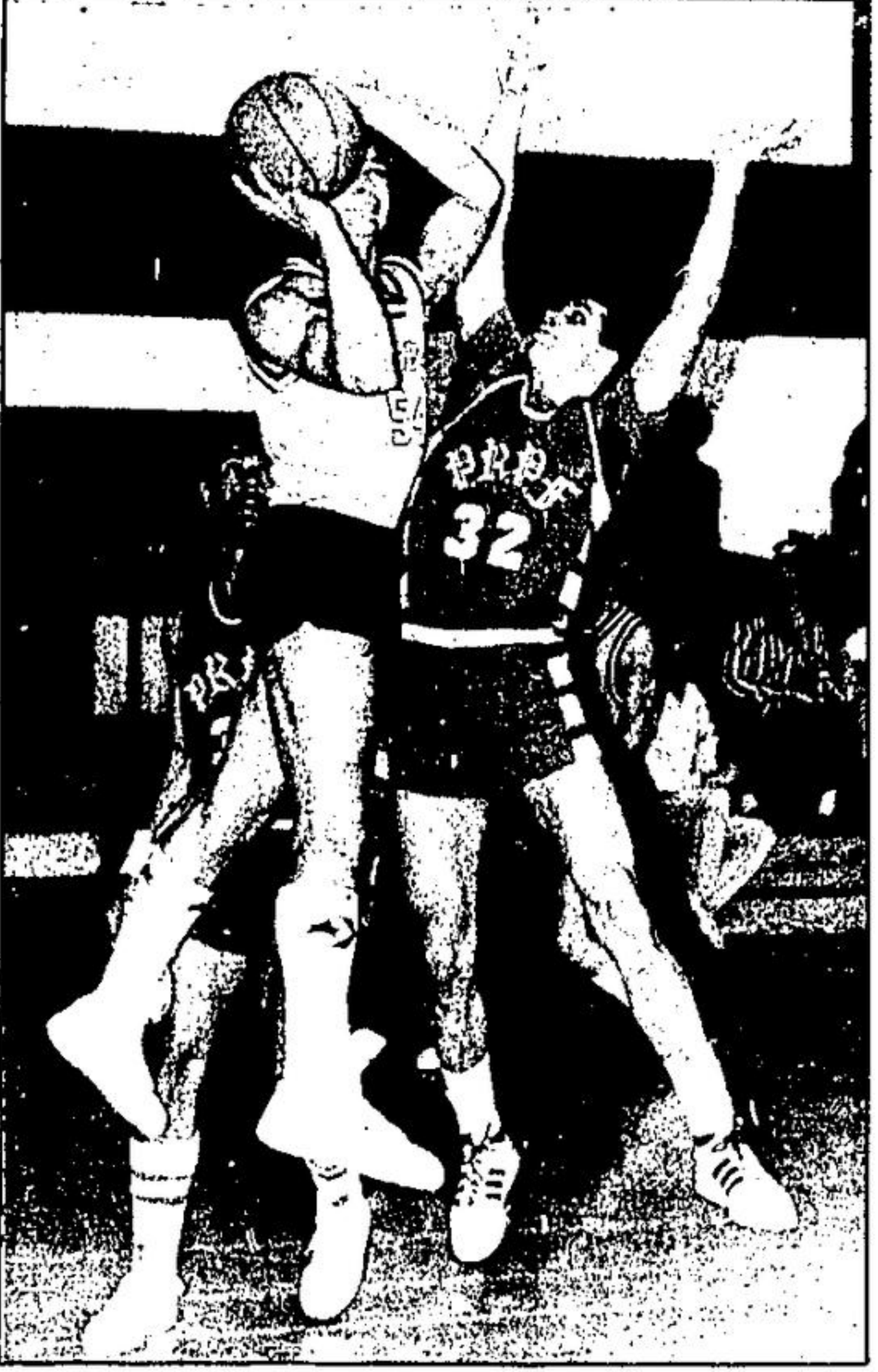

BURLINGTON-A recent rash of illness couldn't have been more costly to the Georgetown District High School midget boys' basketball team.

With a number of starters out or playing half speed the result of illness the Rebels couldn't maintain their pace as Nelson High School recorded a 60-41 Halton playoff win Friday in Burlington.

Just before the game Rebels' coach Moe Leeking found out point guard Chris Stoddard was too ill to play. That meant shuffling responsibilities to people not quite familiar with the new position.

Also, two other starters played with illness but weren't 100 per cent. The timing for the illnesses too couldn't have come at a worse time, Leeking said.

"It was 31-28 Nelson at the half and the guys and I were convinced they could be had," Leeking said. "But in the second half their guard John Blackmore lit up and we started hurrying things on our press breaker."

"Had we been healthy it would have been a really good game," Leeking added.
