

Redmen at volleyball championships

Acton learns OFSAA lesson

WINDSOR—The lessons learned at this year's Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) "A" volleyball tournament could prove valuable in future for the Acton High School senior girls team.

The Redmen dropped all five of their matches, but went to the limit in four of them before being edged out. The tournament was held last week in Windsor.

"The competition was pretty good and we played well in three of our five matches," said Redmen coach Bruce Andrews. "I think we need another year and at least now we know what it's like."

The tournament marked the first time an Acton team had taken part at an OFSAA level.

The Redmen started off again Oppongoe (near Ottawa) and won the first game 15-13. However, the opposing squad rallied to win the next two contests (15-8, 15-4).

The Redmen also went to the three-game limit in their next three contests against Centennial, Tecumseh and Rainy River. In their final game of the tournament against Rockway of Kitchener the Redmen dropped the series in two games (14-16, 9-15).

"My goal at OFSAA was for us not to disgrace ourselves because we had no idea about what to expect,"

Andrews said. "I don't feel we disgraced ourselves as we went to the limit in four of our matches."

"What surprised me was the calibre of play," Andrews added. "There were some good teams at the 'A' level."

This was Andrews' first year coaching senior girls volleyball. He plans to return to the team as coach next year.

"I've got a lot more to learn and I certainly want to do better next

year," Andrews said. "One way is building the program from within the school because we don't have many players coming in from feeder schools."

"We now have a better idea about next year and what we have to be ready for," Andrews said.

As for a nucleus, Andrews is hoping on the return of about six players from this year's team, including four starters.

Bantam tournament off and running

The Georgetown International Bantam Hockey tournament has begun play, and will continue right up to the championship final slated for 8 p.m. Saturday evening at the Alcott Arena.

A total of 32 teams are entered in this year's event with four classifications. The four classes are AAA, AA, A and B-BB. Georgetown will have two representatives in the tournament with the M and M Pro Sports (AA) and Bantam II squad from Johnson's and Associates (B-BB).

The M and M Pro Sports team has played a couple of games to date. However, the locals have yet to taste victory after losing 6-1 to Erindale and 3-1 to Unionville. In the first game Brent Presswood had the Georgetown goal while Wayne Snow scored the M and M tally against Unionville. Both teams played yesterday as the M and M team met Kitchener while the II squad met Beamsville.

Future contests for the Johnson and Associates club include 8:30 a.m. Wednesday (today) against Wallaceburg and 8:30 a.m. Thursday morning against Levaak.

The round robin will last until Friday when the playoffs begin in the respective classifications. Saturday will be the division playoffs, the crossover as well as the Grand Championship. All games are being played at the Alcott Arena.

Tournament director Wayne Pries

has had to juggle the schedule the past few weeks as teams who confirmed their entry cancelled once qualified for their Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) playoffs. To date a total of 13 teams have cancelled their entry forcing Pries and his organizing committee to go to a reserve list.

"The cancellations are a little high this year but you always have them and know that," he said.

The first 16 teams will have played their games as of today with the next 16 coming in and getting started. Pries said the better teams in this year's tournament are likely to make their debut in the second group of 16.

"Markham will be good as well as Ottawa Valley," he said. "All the scouts are asking when the team from Brampton will be playing. They're looking at a few players there."
