Scotsdale has an on-site rep

Scotsdale Farm will be gaining a resident.

The Untario Heritage Foundation has hired a site co-ordinator to live on the 540 acre farm near Ballinafad.

Ron Reid, a graduate of the University of Guelph, will take up residence in part of the main farmhouse with his family this month.

Mr. Reid has been entrusted with developing a more detailed site plan for the farm, said Brian Rogers, the property administrator for the OHF.

"He'll be our on-site representative and meet the groups and report back to us making recom-

mendations," said Mr. Rogers. Mr. Reid will be encouraging other proposals from people about the use of the farm, donated to the people of Ontario by the late Stewart

and Letty Bennett.

The OHF will be making a presen-tation to the Halton Board of Education tomorrow (Thursday). A consultant's report, released last fall to the public, recommended the Halton Board of Education be a prime user of the site and co-ordinate the activities of the other users.

The Halton Board of Education felt they didn't have the qualifications or expertise to help in the initial planning stages, said Mr. Rogers. Hence, the OHF went ahead

with a site co-ordinator, he said. The Board hasn't yet made any commitment as to their role with Scotsdale Farm. A report suggests that trustees approve a move for staff to continue negotiations with the OHF "in order that this outdoor education site might be made

available to the pupils of Halton."

Optimist Club hasn't been discussed recently, said Mr. Rogers. "I never heard anything more about a camp proposal." Potential users will be invited to meet Ron Reid this month, Mr. Rogers said.

One proposal the OHF has been approached about is from the Bruce Trail Association, They want to reroute part of the trail so that it detours through Scotsdale Farm, Mr. Rogers said.

The television series The Campbells was a success and may be returning to the Scotsdale site if their permit is renewed by the Niagara Escarpment Commission in April, Mr. Rogers said.

There may be some negotiations with regard to the production crew facilities such as trailers near the road, he said.

One possibility for administering the site may be worked out by asking each of the user groups at Scotsdale to participate on a board of directors, said Mr. Rogers.
