Craig still in the running

Acton player trying out for Ont. volleyball team

Herald Sports Editor SCARBOROUGH Acton's Susan Craig is one of 18 girls still in the running for a spot on the Ontario juvenile girls volleyball team.

The 16-year-old, Grade 11 Acton High School student attended the team's second practice session last week held here for five days (Saturday-Wednesday). After she survived a second round of cuts that left the team with the existing 18 candidates. Craig also worked out with the team in the first set of practices held in Waterloo over the Christmas holidays. Like Scarborough, after the practices cuts were made and the Acton player was invited to the next training date.

"I am surprised (to have made it this far)," Craig said after. "Many of the girls trying out played for the summer provincial team and there was one who played for the junior national team.

Craig was invited to the team

tryouts last summer while at a volleyball camp near Bancroft. The provincial team coach was scouting the camp, noticed Craig and asked if she would like to come out for the

team. The Scarborough practices were held twice a day over the five-day period and ran for about three hours each. Over Christmas team hopefuls were involved in three practices that were about two-and-a-half to three hours long.

With the provincial team Craig is being used as a setter, a role she isn't quite familiar with. With both the Acton High School senior girls team and last year's midget club squad Craig didn't spend much time

However, this year Croig is playing junior club ball with Westside in Streetsville and her new coach (Rick McArthur) has had her work on setting the ball. Craig said that has helped her in the juvenile practice sessions. Craig's mother Christine is also coaching the team.



"I wouldn't be doing as well as I am if I didn't get good coaching from my club coach," Craig said. "I've been setting more this year, but I've got to work at it more."

Having played both high school and club volleyball has meant Craig spending a lot of time on the volleyball court. But she added that too has paid off.

"It has given me more playing time and time to practise," she said. One distinct advantage Craig has over most other provincial team candidates is she is left-handed. When going up for a spike, Craig presents blockers with a problem as many aren't used to blocking a spike coming from a left-hander.

"Many of the girls hate blocking a left-handed person," Craig sald. Craig is the only person from Halton out to the team's camp. Even though she knew no one going in, Craig said the other girls have made her feel comfortable.

The provincial team candidates will again practise in May, with another session likely planned for sometime during the summer. Final cuts won't probably be made until after the summer.

Craig knows the competition for a spot on the team will be keen. Her major objective is to play well and see what happens.

"I'd like to make the team, but I think it will be hard. I just want to play the best that I can," she said.


