## Resident offers land free for speed limit trade-off

A Norval resident is willing to give away some of his land in exchange for Peel Region reducing the speed limit on a portion of Mississauga Road.

Brian Hardacre has some property at the intersection of Caledon Base Line and Mississauga Road near Belfountain.

The Region wants to straighten the intersection, which is currently

S-shaped and hazardous. The corner has been a "consistent problem", said Traffic Engineer Bill Brown and "no remedial work has lessened the sub-standard design."

Mr. Hardacre is building a residence on his stretch of property. He's willing to give Peel Region a portion of his land for them to straighten the intersection.

But he wants the Region to agree to reducing the speed limit from 60 kilometres per hour to 50 km.

The S-turn actually forces motorists to slow down at the intersection, Mr. Hardacre said. If the intersection is straightened, the road near his home will be filled with speeding cars, he said.

The Region offered compensation for the property, but a March 21 deadline has passed and the property will now be expropriated by the Region.

Over the years the Region has tried a variety of remedial solutions to the corner, which they consider dangerous to motorists.

An advisory speed sign, a curve sign and limiting the speed to 60 km per hour have been some of the measures taken by the Region, Mr. Brown said.

There have been a number of accidents at the corner although none have been fatal, said Mr. Brown.

Based on the number of motorists driving the road, the intersection has one of the worst records in the Region, Mr. Brown said.

Mr. Hardacre said there are about six houses along the stretch of road near his property. Drivers are disobeying speed limits now and they're passing school buses, he said.

Some OPP officers have mentioned to him the area has a problem with speeders.

Mr. Brown said the amount of traffic on Mississauga Road will grow in the future. He agrees it will take more police enforcement in the area. The Region will also be looking at a flashing beacon and consider a speed limit that is "most reasonable" after the new intersection is completed.
