Raider's history, experience main reasons Flamboro picks up Tataryn

Georgetown Chrysler Raiders goalic Dave Tataryn has been added to Flamboro Motts Clamatoes' lineup in time for the team's drive towards an Allan Cup championship.

The 35-year-old Tataryn was notified of the transaction last Wednesday and attended Flamboro's practice later that night. Flamboro started its best-of-seven Allan Cup semi final series against Cornerbrook, Nfld., Friday in Brant-

If the series goes the distance, the deciding contest will be played Saturday in Brantford. The winner will travel to either Winnipeg, Mon., or Nelson, B.C., to play in the Allan Cup final slated for April 25-May 2. The series currently is tied 2-2 with the fifth game going tonight. Game

Six will be played tomorrow even-Tataryn won't likely see any action in the Flamboro goal. He was added as insurance just in case Flamboro starting goalie Ken Ellacott or backup Bob Ferguson get

hurt or don't perform well. Tataryn said he isn't hoping for either player to get hurt or falter so that he may get some playing time. Also, Tataryn hadn't been on skates for over three weeks prior to

attending the Clamatoes' practice. He last saw game action Mar. 4 when the Raiders tangled with Dundas Real McCoys in the first round of the Senior "A" playoffs. Dundas eliminated Georgetown 4-0 in the best-of-seven series.

"If I have to see ice time it means they're (Flamboro goalies) not doing their job," Tataryn said. "That's not my way of thinking (hoping for injury). I'm past that stage."

By virtue of qualifying for the Allan Cup playoffs, Flamboro was allowed to add one goaltender to its lineup. Clamatoes' GM Don Robertson explained why he elected to take

"Dave is a veteran of Allan Cup play, he's been there and has the experience," Robertson said, "On a given night he's as good as anyone in our league."

Robertson said Flamboro will start out using Ellacott in goal, but didn't dismiss the possibility that

Tataryn might see some action. "I'm making no predictions," he said. "We're happy to have Dave

This marks the third time Tataryn has been picked up by another team heading into the Allan Cup playoffs. Back in 1979 Tataryn was added to Thunder Bay's lineup when the regular goalie got hurt. Tataryn played in the final two games as Thunder Bay lost to Petrolia in the deciding game in the Allan Cup semi

finals. Tataryn was picked up by Petrolia in 1981 and actively played for the Squires' Allan Cup winning team that year. In all, Tataryn has played in four Allan Cup finals (three with Cambridge, one with Petrolia), and was part of two championship winners. Also, Tataryn was the Most Valuable Player in two of these

On the two prior occasions he was picked up, Tataryn said he felt a part of the team because he knew he would be able to play. However this

time fitting in will be difficult. "I'd feel a lot better if it was my team (in playoffs)," he said. "I don't feel like a part of the team. I know a lot of the players but I haven't shared in their blood, sweat and

tears. You can't be part of a team

until you contribute. "I'm insurance just in case Ellacott goes down, But he's durable and I don't expect him to (get hurt) and I don't expect to play. When I was picked up by Thunder Bay and Petrolia I knew I was going to play."

Tataryn said when at Flamboro's practice he noticed the Clamatoes didn't have as many good shooters as the Raiders. But he knows why the Flamboro team won the Senior "A" loop and why they're playing for a berth in the Allan Cup finals. "Work, practice and they're very disciplined," he said.

Tataryn spent a total of nine years in the Senior ranks. His first seven were with Cambridge Hornets, and the last two were with the Raiders. As a Hornet Tataryn played in over



180 games and had a goals-against

average of 3.33. As a Raider Tataryn played in 45

of 47 games (including playoffs) his first year and registered a 3.89 goals-against average (third best in the league). This year Tataryn played in 17 games during the regular season and led the league with a 4.09 goals-against mark. Tataryn also played in two of the Raiders' playoff games against Dun-
