Blow torch bandit

An Acton youth was caught early Thursday morning in the back yard of a Wilbur Street home he broke into minutes before. A blow torch was used to cut a hole in a kitchen screen door and then a French door was broken. Once inside credit cards and a camera were taken. Twenty minutes after police arrived the thief was caught and all that was taken was recovered. The total value of damage including what was taken was \$1,000, police said.

No funding for landfill opponents

Should Halton Region be funding groups which oppose its proposed andfill sites?

Planning and public works committee members last week agreed with an earlier decision by the region's solid waste management committee not to.

The question came up in response to a \$15,000 grant request by the West Burlington Citizens Group. It feels the region's choice of Site F, next to the existing landfill in Burlington, is unsuitable. It wants the grant to pay for professional and legal representation at both the upcoming preliminary and full hear-

Burlington Coun. Walter Mulkewich wanted the region to establish a fund which would give "intervenor" grants to credible groups in the areas of the region's Burlington and Milton proposed landfill sites.

He pointed out the Ontario Waste Management Corporation has done this with its search for a toxic waste

process will be under severe criticism at the hearings," Coun. Mulkewich said. "It would be a shame to have it under more criticism. It could help the region's case and possibly save it more money if Halton were to give citizens groups a head start to be able to do a good job at the hearings."

Oakville Coun. Liz Behrens didn't agree. She said "intervenor funding!" should come from outside Halton.

If the province sees local municipalities and regions are funding these groups, it won't make any effort to share in this funding, Coun. Behrens pointed out.

She said setting such a precedent would haunt the region later when it comes time for Energy From Waste

"I agree with Liz that if we get into funding now, the province will never get into it," Milton Coun, Bill Johnson said.

Halton Hills Coun. Pam Sheldon said councillors were elected to represent the public's views and are paid to do so. She didn't agree with paying another group to do the same thing.

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
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
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
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
