Emergency culvert doesn't come cheap

An emergency situation at the Trafalgar Road culvert at Snows Creek is forcing Halton to pay top dollar for repair work.

Halton's Public Works Director Bob Moore said the region is paying more than it would normally pay for such work because the project is an isolated one, away from any other reconstruction works in that area, as well as being an emergency situation.

The lowest of three tenders tallies \$82,388, and was made by Permanent Paving Company of Guelph.

Halton doesn't have that much money tucked away in its 1986 budget for this project, but thanks to some monies left over from a Guelph Line reconstruction project, will be able to pay for the culvert.

Public Works engineer Bruce Kitchen said about one month ago, the side fell off the culvert and it was obvious repair work couldn't wait much longer. Regional staff have propped it up with lumber in the interim.

"This culvert is in deplorable condition," Public Works Director Bob Moore said.

"They stick it to you," Burlington's Coun. Pat McLaughlin joked at the region's planning and public works committee meeting last week.




