Raiders taking one year leave

Herald Sports Editor Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have decided to take a one year leave of absence from the Ontario Senior "A"

Hockey League. The decision was made at an executive meeting Apr. 28 when president Finn Poulstrup presented a resolution outlining the move. Poulstrup and the Raiders later notified the OHA by virtue of sending a letter over the

weekend. Poulstrup said Thursday there were two reasons for the decision. He said an inability to double the size of the present executive and poor fan support in the three years the Raiders have been in Senior hockey con-

tributed. "But the will of the executive was the key," Poulstrup said. "If we had 20 executive members we'd have gone and played a heck of a season. But if the will isn't there then we can't do it.

"I'm disappointed but I think the last home game of the year (Game Three of playoff with Dundas played here) was the body blow that rocked the Ralder executive. It was late in the first period and the executive was finishing up the jobs it does during a hockey game. We heard a roar from the crowd and thought we (Georgetown) had scored.

"We went out to look and saw that Dundas had scored.

When we scored it was like we were playing in an away barn. When we get more people from Dundas coming out we've got to question what we're doing."

But Poulstrup doesn't falt the fans for not coming out. "We just didn't provide the entertainment they wanted," he said. "It's like if someone buys a hamburg and doesn't like it he won't go back for another. No. I

don't falt the fans at all." Poulstrup said a Senior "A" franchise operates on a budget in excess of \$100,000 annually. Of that, the club hopes to raise half the money it needs through fundraising while getting the other half through the gate. But the flaiders have had to generate about 80 per cent of its budget through fundraising measures while having the

gate provide the other 20 per cent. "It costs you \$1,000 a game to lose in this league and \$1,500 to win," Poulstrup said. "If we had 100 more people out to the games that would mean about \$500 extra

each game. That's a lot of money. "You need 400 to 500 people in the building all the time," Poulstrup continued, "Ideally your fundraising pays for your away games while your home gate pays for itself. If we had 400 to 500 people in the building we would be in terrific shape.

While the Raiders won't ice a team this season the present executive will continue to work on projects aimed at allowing the club to pay off current financial obligations

and eventually result in the team having \$20,000 for start-up costs. The Raiders will also send represen-

tatives to Senior league meetings throughout the winter. The Raiders' carded players, though, will become free agents and can play with either one of the four remain-

ing hockey teams in the Senior circuit. "If we're going to get back into it why should we be at the disadvantage of not knowing what has gone on in the last 12 months," Poulstrup said.

But Peulstrup too said maybe the Raiders will look at competing at a lower division (like Intermediate "B") so as to give the team more of a local flavor. Throughout he past season many fans said the lack of local talent was a reason why they didn't come out to watch the Raiders play.

"Maybe the thing to do is get into a catibre of play where over-age Junior B players (in Georgetown) have a place to go up to," Poulstrup said. "What you would have in say seven years would be one beck of a bockey club and it would be all local. Maybe we'd have something the people would care about again.

"But if we're not getting the people at the gate to float (a Senior) club competitively then I think we don't have a mandate from the public to continue a team. We'll sit back for a year and see what happens.

"Maybe that will generate some interest," Poulstrup

"It's ironic that the league was concerned about us


last year and changed their import rule," Poulstrup add-
