Rough season for Hayward

WINNIPEG - What a difference just one year makes.

Two seasons ago Winnipeg Jets were fourth overall in the National Hockey League standings. After disposing of Calgary in the first round of playoffs, Winnipeg dropped the Smythe Division final to eventual Stanley Cup champs Edmonton Ollers. Still, Winnipeg was a team perched on the horizon, a team of the luture.

 But this season Winnipeg struggled throughout and finished with a 25-46-6 record, good enough for third spot. However, the Jets put together a late-season surge the final 20 games and team members like Georgetown's Brian Hayward felt maybe a good showing in the playoffs could erase the memories of

Jets' Number Two goalle for the playoffs behind veteran Dan Bouchard. Hayward finished up Game One against Calgary after Bouchard was taken from the game, but Hayward in turn was pulled from the second game after a bad goal and replaced by Bouchard. Both goalles weren't in uniform for the final game as rookle Dan Berthiaume played well in a seriesending 4-3 Calgary decision.

"It hurt when Fergie (coach John Ferguson) said Dan was the Number One," Hayward said early last week in a telephone interview. "In the second game I let in a bad goal and that was it. The last game was kind of upsetting. It felt like a kick in the teeth, I was really excited to be in the playoffs to try and turn things around.

Hayward's season too wasn't a banner one. When Winnipeg enjoyed its 84-85 campaign Hayward led the league in wins for goalies, games played and was in the top five for goals-against average. This season he played in 43 games, (12-27-4) and had an average of 4.87. Based on those numbers the fans and media in Winnipeg pointed the finger of blame to the 28-year-old.

"It did get to me early in the year," Hayward said. "But it was best for me to go back and look at the game film and see that I wasn't playing badly.

"I could have played a lot better than I did this year, but you must have communication with everyone and know what they're going to do. I still don't know what some guys are going to do in some situations. But you have to look at this year as a learning experience."

At one point during this past year the Jets send Hayward down to the minors for a week. Rather than being disappointed, Hayward used the situation to re-build his confidence. During his stay, Hayward was named the NHL player of the week. "At the time my confidence was




Cyclist has good showing


Cyclist Dermot Cleary had another fine showing this weekend in an event held in London.
