Downtown gets boost from doctors

Downtown Georgetown will soon have a spanking new professional building on Mill Street.

A group of doctors, dentists and lawyers are combining their resources to build a two or three floor building across the street from the Gregory and the Salvation Army

The building was most recently the home of the Halton Regional Police until about five years ago when they moved into a new facility on Guelph Street.

Dr. Bob Bourns is the president of the group, consisting of five doctors, two dentists and two lawyers.

The property was purchased May 5 and the new owners hope to have


said Dr. Bourns. By building their own building, the doctors and other professionals can help to plan and design the structure. Nowadays, doctors are concerned with better

patient flow and avoiding running

from one room to another, Dr.

Bourns said. The tenants will each have a share in the building, as they are also the owners. Medical Data Sciences (MDS) will run the laboratory and they will own a share of the building

as well. The owners felt that it was important for the building to blend into the surrounding architecture and this has been done, Dr. Bourns said.




This is an architect's drawing of the new professional building that will be built on the site of the old police station on Mill Street in Georgetown. The red house at 79

their new building completed by the early months of 1987.

The bullding will have to be demolished and a new structure put up because it is too impractical to renovate, said Dr. Bourns.

When looking for a location for a building, the doctors wanted to be downtown, Dr. Bourns said, "It was downtown or nowhere. The most significant factor was for us to be downtown," he said. "It certainly shows the professionals here are committed to the downtown," he ad-



The vast majority of the doctors moving in, practise in the downtown area and some have done so for over 20 years, he said.

The building will have access to the handicapped and provide parking, an elevator, an X-ray and

laboratory plus a pharmacy. "For the doctors it's convenient to have one stop medicine (all in one bullding)," he said.

"Our concern was to move into a more modern (medical) facility."

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Mill Street beside the structure will remain. The present building will be demolished and a two or three floor structure with a basement will be constructed.

The owners still need a town building permit before they turn any sod, which is proposed for June. The building will be three stories plus a half-size basement, depending on whether a few more tenants can be found, Dr. Bourns said.

Ironically, the building used to be the home and office of Dr. Reginald Paul, a physician who worked out of his home about 25 years ago. After that, it was used as a bank.

Town Treasurer Ray King said the town had over \$100,000 in its parkland reserve fund from subdivision agreements.

"You're looking at three and a half acres for one soccer pitch and \$100,000 isn't going to get you very much," Mr. Shepard said.

He sald less than 50 per cent of the recreational activities scheduled by his department are played on townowned property. The rest are on leased lands from industry or sports

else," Mr. Shepard said. "It's a ridiculous way to operate."

He complained about the Halton Board of Education sports fields, that they aren't maintained or can't be used to the recreation department's satisfaction. Many of the fields aren't the right size for adults, aren't fertilized or weed sprayed at the right time, Mr. Shepard said.

"I don't know whether we're blessed or cursed, but there are more and more adults playing sports in Halton

fields on school properties. "We're at the mercy of somebody Hills." he said. FOR MOM TRULY A FOR DAD **FAMILY**

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
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
