Filler sand

A Burlington company won the tender to replace the top 100 millimetres of the sand filter bed at the Acton Water Pollution Control Plant with clean and washed pea gravel.

D.L. Spenser Ltd. submitted the lowest tender at \$24,522 for this job to replace the filter bed which is part of a cleanup system unique in North America for wastewater. Compared to Halton's other water pollution control plants, Acton has more stringent Ministry of the Environment guidelines.

- The Town's reserves and reserve funds amounted to \$2,762,026. as of December 31, 1985. This represents an increase of \$290,793 over 1984. The majority of these funds have been allocated for future capital projects and other specific purposes.
- During 1985 capital purchases and projects with gross expenditures amounting to \$2,635,818. were undertaken. Projects included purchase office equipment, fire equipment, road construction, storm sewer construction, public works vehicles, streetlighting and various improvements in parks and other recreational facilities.
- The Town continued with its "pay-as-you-go" policy for financing capital projects. No long-term debt was incurred during the year, thus improving the already very sound debt position of the Town.



500 fire inspections

Firelighters on a call will wear breathing apparatus if there's any smoke at all, he said.

Although the fire department doesn't solicit information from local firms as to what chemicals they've got stored on their premises, it does

keep records when inspections are made, Last year, the department undertook 500 inspections, including reinspections if there were violations of the fire code found in the original

inspection. Of those, Mr. Meads estimated 25 per cent were industrial inspections. The other 75 per cent were residential inspections, especially of buildings

with lots of people in them. As well as being inspected by the town's fire department, many of the larger industries are inspected three times a year by their insurance companies. It's understandable, considering the big investment an insurance company is taking on. Many of these firms not only have to meet the fire code but are over and above what the fire code requires.

When the fire prevention officer goes out to do an inspection, he usually meets with co-operation, Mr. Meads said. "A company doesn't want to be put out of business any more than we want to see them have a fire," he


Marport Corporation Ltd. for a pro-

TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLSS THE ONTARIO WEED CONTROL ACT

as It applies to persons in possession of land within the Town of Halton Hills.

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by May 26th, 1986, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, The Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.

Goatsbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act.

Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
