Nine players not enough for season
Specters fold ball club

 Last year's Inter-County Fastball League champions won't be back to defend their title this season.
 Thursday team members of Glen Williams Specters decided to suspend operations for a year due to a lack of player interest. The decision was made after just nine players were present for the Specters' season opener in Orangeville Thursday night. The players met prior to the start of the contest, made their decision and then notified the Orangeville squad. The game subsequently was not played.
 The lack of players comes as somewhat of a surprise. When Glen

Williams played its first exhibition game two weeks ago there were 14 players present. However, at last Tuesday's practice (just two days prior to the season opener) just six players worked out. As the opener drew closer, players were deciding against playing fastball this summer and eventually just the nine who made the trip to Orangeville were left.
 The decision to suspend operations came one night after rookie manager Bob Davidson decided to leave the club. Although Davidson wouldn't offer a reason for leaving, some players suggested he took the declining numbers as being his fault.
 "A few things happened and I

thought it was best that I leave," Davidson said.
 "As far as I was concerned, I thought he was going to be a good ball coach," said Specters' catcher Glen Fendley. "I think he thought it was all his fault."
 "But it wasn't. If some of the guys had brought it (decision not to play ball) up a couple of weeks earlier we could have asked some others. But this close to the season players had made commitments," Fendley said.
 Even though the Specters only asked for a one year leave, Fendley said the future of the team might be in doubt.
 "All we asked for was a one year leave of absence, but it will be tough

to start up again," he said.
 Like other Specters The Herald contacted, Fendley was disappointed with the decision.
 "It's very disappointing," he said. "A real shock."
 "I'm very disappointed and surprised," commented fellow catcher Brian Peavoy. "If some of the players had committed themselves at the start, then we could have gone looking. It's a shock to us."
 Pitcher Moe Curtis said the move hurt even more in light of the Specters winning the league title last year.
 "This isn't a good way to go out," he said. "With the nine guys we had, you can't go through a season like that. I guess guys had other things to do."

By virtue of not having played a game, the Specters get \$150 from the league. However, the team loses its entry fee.

Now that the league has been notified of the Specters' intentions, all Glen Williams players will be free agents.

Rebels successfully defend Halton team track award

The Georgetown District High School track team successfully defended its Halton overall title last week.

The Rebels won the girls division with 195 points and were second in the boys standings to take the overall championship. The Halton track meet was held at both Nelson High School and Etobicoke Stadium on Tuesday and Friday respectively last week.

In addition, the Rebels qualified many competitors for tomorrow's Peel-Halton meet slated for Etobicoke. The top competitors at the Peel-Halton event will qualify for the Regional meet which will be held next Wednesday in Niagara Falls.

Mike Wood and Andy Kiss finished second and third respectively in the 2000-metre Steeplechase. In the hurdles competition Louis DePaoli was first in the senior boys 110-metre hurdles while Brian Doherty was fourth. Marye Boks won the midget girls 80-metre competition while Bonnie Clarke was second.

Glenn Mulder took top honors in the midget boys' 400-metre race

while Stewart Teetzel was sixth. In the junior boys event, Yanne Letarnec won the race while teammate Brendan Cleary finished second. In the girls' races Jody Barwell was second in the senior race while Karen Pepper was fifth. Shannon Snyder was third in the junior girls event while Tara Burroughs was third in the midget girls race and Tara Bouskill was sixth.

Mulder was also first in the midget boys 800-metre race while teammate Cam Herman was fourth. Letarnec was third in the junior boys event while Kiss was fourth in the senior race. Bouskill finished second in the midget girls race as Sonia Letarnec was fifth. Shawn Langdon was fifth in the senior girls event while Linda Wenham was sixth.

Mulder added a third top finish, this time in the midget boys 1,500-metre race. Bob Donker finished in third. In the junior race Jim Clark was sixth. Amy Powers was third in the junior girls race and Janelle Lewis finished sixth. Bouskill was fourth in the midget girls race while in the senior event Langdon was third and Wenham was fourth. Erik Hopkins won the senior boys race while Wood was fourth.

Hopkins was also first in the senior boys 3,000-metre race while Wood was fourth. Donker finished second in the midget boys competition with Dave Seida ending up sixth. In the junior race Jim Clark was third and Dave Paul fifth. Powers was second in the junior girls race while Liette Chasson was fifth. Kara Lynn Palmer was sixth in the midget race while Wenham was third in the senior race and teammate Langdon finished fourth.

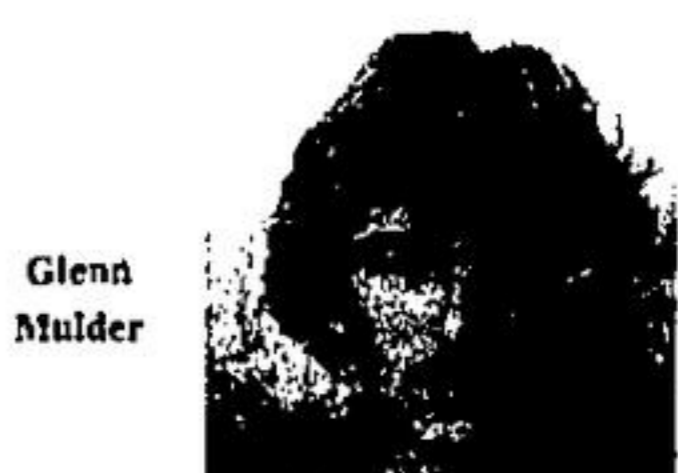
DePaoli was second in the open boys 400-metre hurdles race while Louise Evans was sixth in the open girls competition.

In the 100-metre races, Anna Toone and Tara Burroughs were fourth and fifth in the midget girls event while Jody Barwell was third in the senior girls race. Stewart Teetzel was seventh in the midget boys race.

Burroughs added a fourth place finish in the midget girls' 200-metre race while Toone was fifth. Barwell was third in the senior girls race while Louise DePaoli won the senior boys race.

The Rebel relay teams also did well, capturing a first, four seconds and a third spot finish.

Toone, Teri Korzack, Lisa Carter and Burroughs were first in the midget girls 4 x 100 race while Barwell, Janice Gregson, Trina Wasylenko and Snyder were second in the senior girls event. Juniors Jim Manning, Joe Balsom, Cleary and Letarnec were also second in their class while in the Open Boys 4 x 400 race DePaoli, Cleary, Manning and Letarnec were second. The open girls 4 x 400 team of Powers, Barwell, Snyder and Burroughs finished third.

In the field events Jay Anderson won the senior boys javelin competition. Andreas Schirm was second in the midget boys high jump while Carter was fourth in the midget girls event. Kim Dryden was second in the senior girls competition.

In the long jump competition Korzack was second in the midget girls competition while Carter was third. Glenn McCaughy was third in the senior boys class while Karen Pepper was seventh in the senior girls event.

Jon Hammer was second in the senior boys shot put while Gugga Hjalmsdottir was second in the senior girls shot put. Kathy Barton was fourth in the junior girls shot event. Hammer also added a third place finish in the senior boys discus while Hjalmsdottir was fourth in the senior girls competition. Kirk Seargentson was fourth in the midget boys discus event also.

Five Acton Redmen qualify for P-H meet

Acton High School will be sending five competitors to this week's Peel-Halton track meet.

The Redmen athletes qualified for the event by finishing in the top four of their respective categories at last week's Halton meet. That event was held at Etobicoke Stadium and Nelson High School.

Junior Maria Brillinger led the way for the Redmen by qualifying for three events. Brillinger won the 200 and 400 metre races (27.5 seconds and 60.3 seconds respectively) as well as finishing second in the 800-metre competition in 2:28.7.

Midget Lesia Shrubsole won the girls discus event with a throw of 24.81 metres, was second in the shot put with an effort of 7.8 metres and was fourth in javelin (23.67 metres). Also, Darryl Bartlett qualified for Peel-Halton as the junior competitor was third in the 110-metre hurdles in 16.4 seconds.

Melissa Corson will compete in the midget girls shot event the result of taking the gold at the Halton meet. Corson had a put of 8.09 metres. As well, Sue Craig will represent Halton in the junior girls long jump competition as Craig won the class at last week's meet with a jump of 4.82 metres.

Acton track coach Bruce Andrews said he was pleased to see five of his athletes advance. In total Acton had 14 athletes compete in the Halton

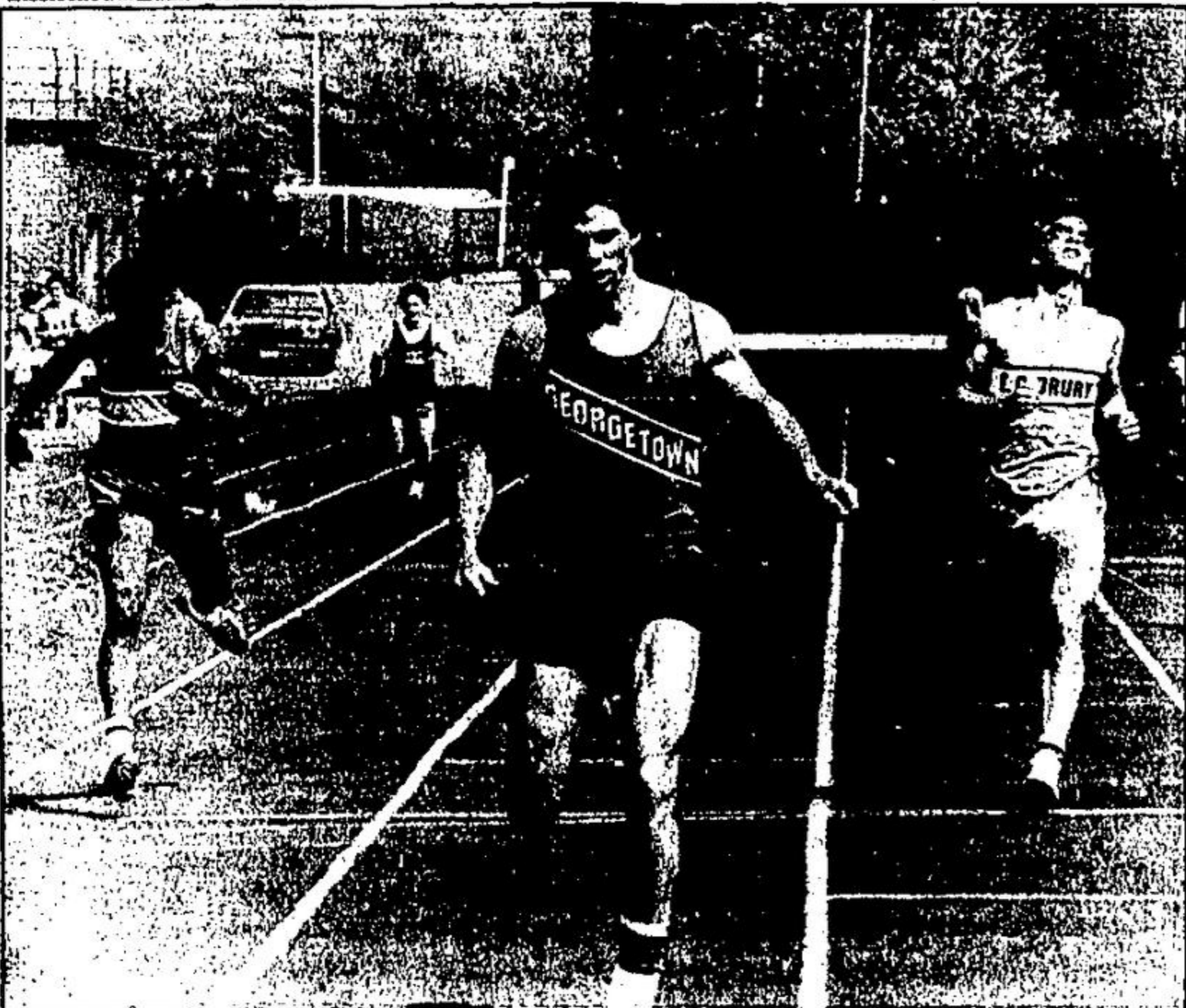
