Co-op works, thanks to firms, students

Businesses were recognized for participating in one of the fastest growing credit programs in high schools today.

Georgetown District High School congratulated students who have graduated from their 1985-86 co-op programs at a ceremony last Wednesday.

The employers of the students were invited along and they too received thanks for their co-operation in the program.

Each of the students were placed in a business, agency or school for four months, working half days.

Co-ordinator of the program is Bert Cocks. Co-op works for students because they can practise their knowledge and skills in the workplace, Mr. Cocks said.

Principal Barb Singleton also offered some words of support and encouragement about the co-op program.

"Kids can try on a couple of different hats," she said. "They can try it on and see if they like it."

The co-op program also allows for community members to see what the school is doing, she said. "It's a way to see that we've got some of the best kids in the province," she said.

The program has grown dramatically in the past three years. There were 10,000 students in Ontario enrolled in co-op in 1982. That number has hit 30,000 in 1985.

At Georgetown District High School there were 185 applicants for next semester but only 140 will be placed because that's all the administration can handle. Even so, the program is expanding as fast as the 25 per cent growth rate predicted by the Ontario government, said Mr. Cocks.

Co-op students Jon Hammer and Chris Farrugon told the audience about their experiences in the workplace. Then former Chamber of Commerce president Dave Kenner said a few words about the program from an employer's perspective.

Craig Banks was given a special award for his excellence in the co-op program. He won the Co-operative Education Association's most outstanding co-op student award for the southern Ontario region.
