Acton water ban?

Summer water restrictions may yet be imposed on Acton residents. The region's planning and public

works committee last week deferred making a decision on imposing the summer water restrictions on the community of 7,000.

Regional public works staff recommend that should the daily demand exceed the capacity of Acton's wells, Acton residents will be asked to restrict lawn watering to homes with odd and even numbers on alternate dates.

If that's not enough, then a total restriction on lawn watering would be imposed.

If further restrictions are necessary, even car washing and air conditioning cooling would be prohibited.

Best for sludge

When it comes to sludge, Halton Region is number one in Canada.

That's according to Hank Van-Veen of B and H Haulage Ltd., a Brantford firm which has been involved in the haulage and spreading of sludge from Halton's Water Pollution Control Plants since 1981.

"Halton Region is number one in sludge disposal, not only in Ontario, but in Canada," Mr. Van-Veen told regional councillors last week.

He said delegations have come from Quebec City, the federal government's Experimental Farm in Ottawa, from the Ministry of the Environment and from as far away as Manitoba to see Halton's

Water test grants

Grants for water projects in Acton and Georgetown were announced last month by the Ministry of the Environment.

Halton Region is to receive \$51,000 towards investigating additional wells in Milton and Halton Hills; \$27,000 for a test drilling program in Georgetown, and \$24,000 to build and equip a pumphouse at Acton's new Fourth Line well; and \$72,000 for a 350 mm watermain on Churchill Road North from the Davidson well to the Acton reser-

Halton Region got a total of \$5,649,000 in Ministry grants for the 1986-87 year.

Approval of these grants is given on the condition that the work begins this year.





