Downtown merchants sponsor the three day event each year in an effort to bring more people downtown to see what they have to offer. You won't be disappointed.

Exhibits and the bargains will run Thursday 9 a.m. - 9 p.m., Friday 9 a.m. - 9 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. - 6 p.m.

The action begins Thursday at 9 a.m. with a sidewalk sale, giving the businesses in the area a chance to show you just what they can do. At 11 a.m. a book-binding demonstration is being held at Oxbow Books.

By noon if you're hungry, there is a licenced patio garden where you can sip a cool drink, catch some sun and listen to the music.

Dr. Bandoli's Travelling Goodtime Show will have your sides splitting with their comic routines and adventure spoofs. The juggling comedians are with the Del Rio Sisters.

At 2 p.m. Whimsey's is holding a stained glass demonstration while the children can enjoy pioneer games at the main intersection at 2:30 p.m.

The official opening ceremonies gets underway with a Main Street parade and a presentation by Mayor Russ Miller. For musical entertainment the Georgetown Girls Pipe Band will be playing and the Centennial Alumni Choir are also featured.

If you like to dance or just listen to good country music, enjoy the patio lounge and see Gary Poot and Country Syde. Inside the McGibbon Hotel Wild Honey is playing.

During each of the three days there will be

an outdoor flag display on Wesleyan Street. The downtown merchants are giving away free balloons and draws at a central location and an information booth have been set up if you have questions. A section has been set aside for a series of booths manned by services agencies interested in helping seniors. After all, June 16-21 is Seniors Awareness Week in Halton!

And speaking of seniors, the Herald sponsored award given to the Pioneer Citizen will be handed out to former World War One veteran Harry Hale Saturday at 2 p.m. The Penniesworth Youngest Pioneer Citizen is given out to the youngster whenever he or she arrives at the hospital!

After 6 p.m. every night the antique fire truck will be on display along with one of our ambulances and crews.

Neil Cotton and The Racqueteers perform from 8 p.m. until midnight while Gary Poot and Country Syde and Wild Honey are featured at the McGlbbon.

Saturday starts off different with a Lions Club pancake breakfast. At 12 noon there will be a decorated bicycle parade, courtesy of the parks and recreation department.

A horticultural society, flower show and strawberry social are around the corner at Knox Presbyterian Church starting at 2 p.m.

For a hearty laugh don't forget to show up at the Pioneer Costume contest and see contestants of all ages try and look like a pioneer.

The day ends with Gary Poot's band from 47 p.m. and 8 p.m. - midnight. Wild Honey is again at the McGibbon Lounge from 9 p.m.
