The Clinic is staffed by two lawyers (David Craig, Director of the Clinic, and Jack Fleming, Staff Lawyer), one community legal worker (Karen Thompson-Harry)

and one support staff (June Wilde).

An independent community Board of Directors manages the Clinic. Any resident of Halton Region may run for election to the Board of Directors at the annual general meeting in the fall. John Nichols is the current Chairperson.

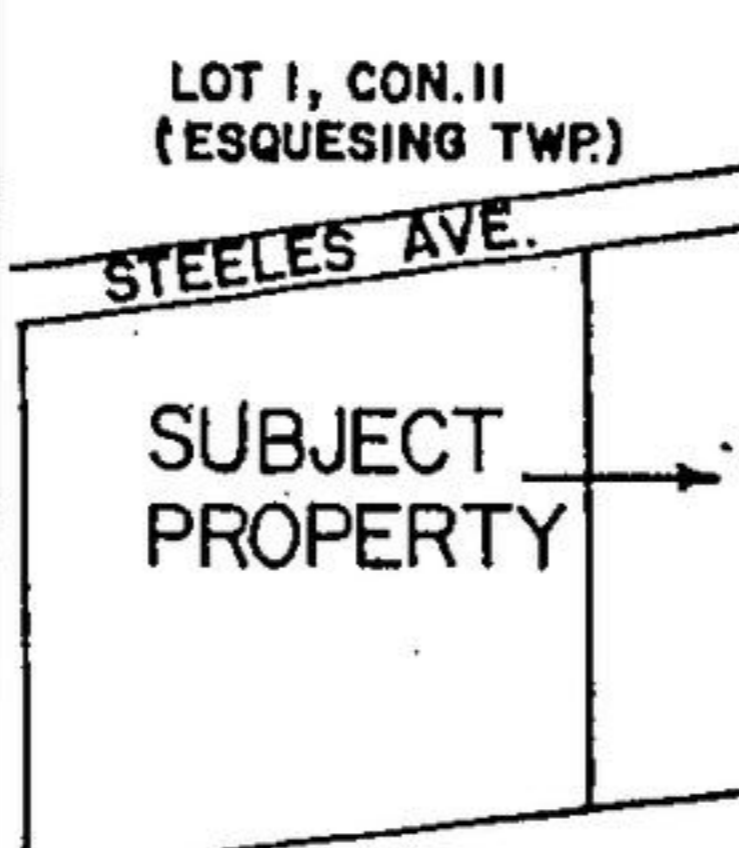


NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

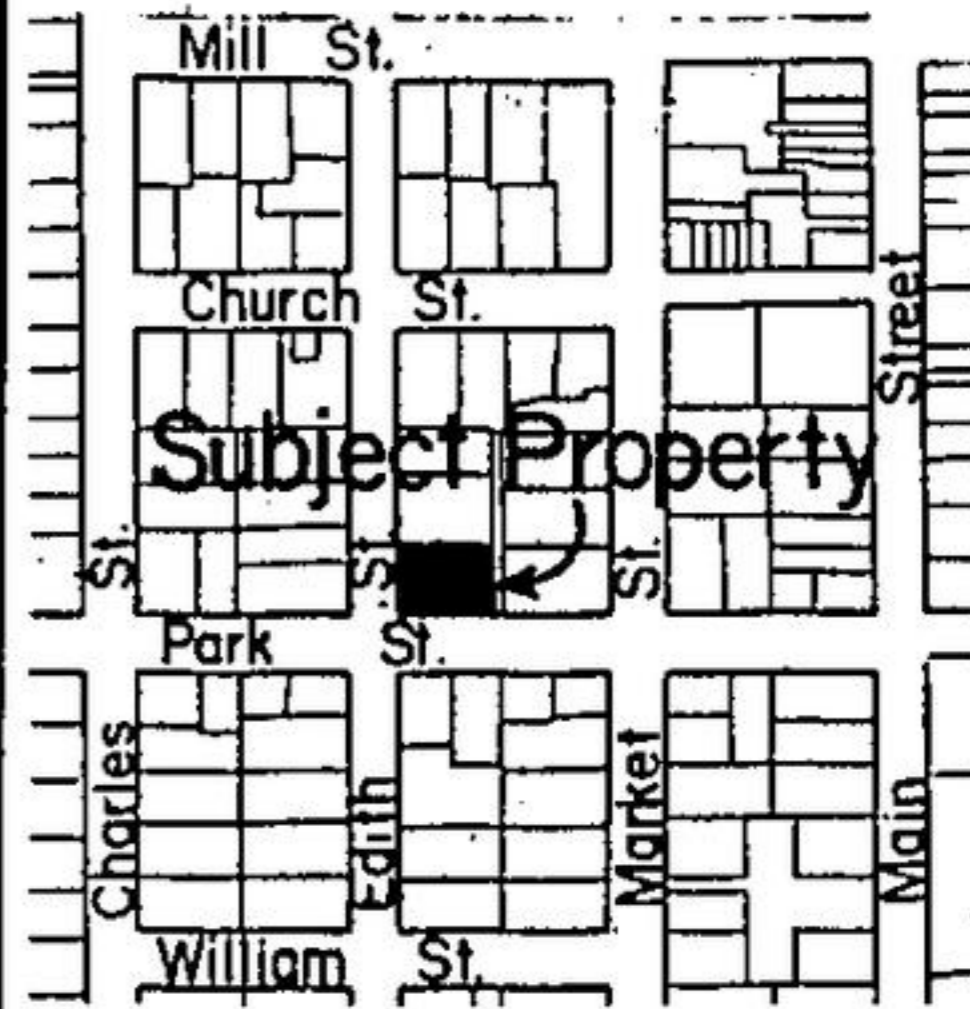

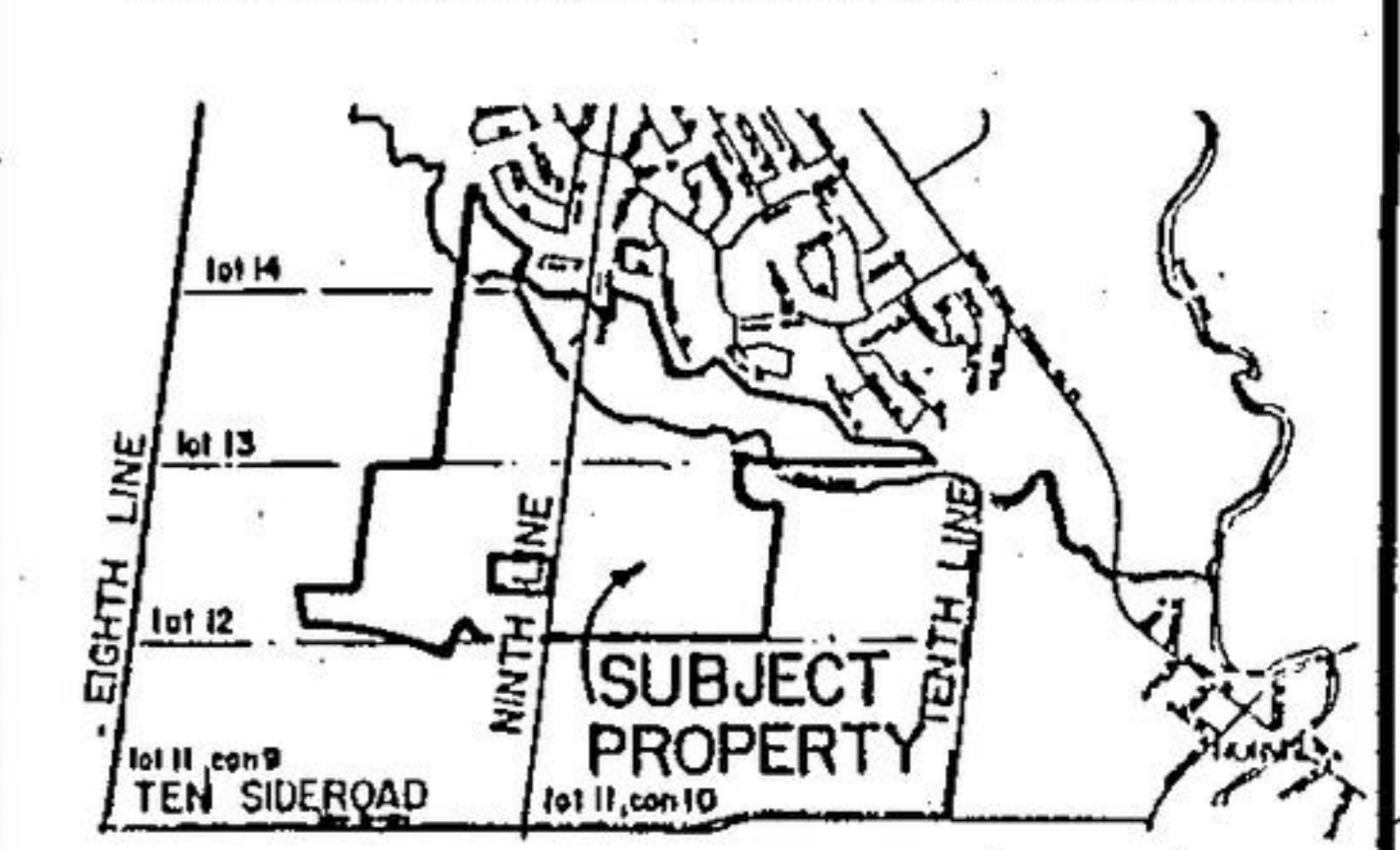
