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In the hills

Six new homes

A proposal to build a bungalow and five semi-detached homes in RR 1 Puslinch, actually Part Lot 27, Con. 2, in Acton, got the okay from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority this month.

Cedar Mill Homes Limited wants to construct a 35 feet by 35 feet bungalow and five 30 feet by 40 feet semi-detached homes in an area regulated by the Authority.

The Authority wants assurance that fill material upon which the homes are to be built is stable. It also wants straw bales placed at the base of the slope to control sediment and runoff during construction.

Landfill

Mrs. J. Hunter of RR1 Terra Cotta recently got Credit Valley Conservation Authority approval to put approximately 457 cubic metres of fill in the Silver Creek floodplain. She wants to put in the fill on Part Lot 19 Con. 9 in Georgetown to improve drainage on her property.

The fill is to be placed on the upstream side of Ewing Street, and should have a negligible effect on flood levels due to the existing backwater effect of Ewing.

The Authority requires that all disturbed areas must be seeded or sodded by Aug. 31 this year.

Mud-room

A Glen Williams man got permission to build a "mud-room" on to his home at Part Lot 22 Con. 10, from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

Mr. L.D. Peck got permission for the floodproofed addition to his home Friday. Mr. Peck lives on Main Street.

Hydro project

Haltom Hills Hydro got approval to partially reconstruct a hydro substation and replace existing soil material with gravel in Acton.

The approval was given at a recent meeting of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. The electric commission wants to undertake these works in the Black Creek floodplain on Part Lot 28, Con. 3.

The Authority requires that the areas disturbed by the construction be stabilized to prevent erosion and the switch gear assembly be elevated above the regional flood elevation.

Road detours

Pull out the calendar and mark down these dates: Aug. 6, 7, and 8.

These are the dates Canadian National Railway will be making improvements to their rail lines in Haltom Hills.

There'll be a temporary road closure Aug. 6 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. of Trafalgar Road between Maple Avenue and Highway 7; and a temporary closure Aug. 7 and 8 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. of each day of Sidroad 15 between Fifth and Sixth Lines.

CNR want to replace the present bolted rail with a continuous welded rail. Approximately 32 pieces of machinery and on-track equipment will be used.

Grads go back to school

The University of Toronto 1988 Spring Reunion was held June 7. Honored years were - 1916, 1928, 1938, 1946 and 1961, plus all years prior to 1916.

The most senior alumnus to attend was a 1915 graduate in Dentistry, Dr. William C. Leggett. He grew up in Chaffey's Locks which is north of Kingston on the Rideau Canal System, but resides in Toronto today.

Among those attending from Georgetown were Tom Ramautarsingh who coordinated the Host and Hostess Committee and welcomed and escorted Dr. Leggett to the Great Hall in Hart House for the luncheon receptions. Mrs. Jessie Glynn (retired Georgetown District High School Teacher), and Dave Hastings of The Herald who is a member of the Blue and White Band.

Born in 1883 and graduated in 1915, Dr. Leggett was the founder of the now famous Blue and White Band. There were 35 original members. Dr. Leggett recalls such

Today Dr. Leggett is the Honorary Conductor of the Blue and White Band. He recalls with a twinkle in his eye that medical and dental annual fees were \$135 per student. Arts and science students

paid \$35 per student annually. Activities included class reunions, video programs, visits to Soldiers' Tower, Carillon Concert, bus tours, campus walking tours, luncheons in the Great Hall at Hart House and President George Connell's Garden Party.

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
