**No objection**

At last week's council meeting, councillors let the Niagara Escarpment Commission know they had no objection to the application.

**Recording studio**

A recording studio has been approved for an Acton home.

The Halton Hills Committee of Adjustment approved the request to operate a recording studio at 210 Main St. N. in Acton.

The request was made by Brian Hewson and Barbara Brown. They plan to construct a one-storey addition to their existing building to be used for a laundry room and to expand the front porch.

The recording studio would take up 360 square feet of floor space, with half of that being used for a control room. With concrete floors, and soundproof insulation and materials, the recording studio is to be used mostly to record individuals as there's not much room for groups, Mr. Hewson said.

**Drainage bid**

A Brampton firm has been awarded the tender to do drainage and road work on the McNabb Street area of Georgetown.

G.W. Barr Construction and Engineering Limited came in with the lowest of three tenders, at \$228,523. The town's budget only allowed for \$200,000 for this construction job. However, Town Engineer Bob Austin said he has \$9,000 left over from another project, and the contingency reserve fund will make up the shortfall in funds.

Town Treasurer Ray King warned council about relying too much on the contingency reserve fund.

Durham, Union, McNabb and Murdock Streets are to be worked on.

**June injuries**

Although nobody died because of fires in June, one firefighter and one member of the public were injured.

That's what the monthly activity report of the Halton Hills Fire Department shows.

The department had 33 calls for service last month, and fire damages tallied \$62,512.

Last June, firefighters were busier, with 43 fire calls and damages were higher, \$92,050, from fires.

Already this year, 10 firefighters have been injured on the job, whereas last year the number of injured was only three.
