## Greens keeper can be golfer's friend/foe

Golf is a 'hard enough game without someone making it more so. But regardless of this fact there is someone at every course determined to challenge skill and patience.

This person can add ten strokes to your game by moving the pin placements or pushing back the tees. They can decide to narrow the fairways. They can even distract you with a beautiful flower or a well pruned tree, something you haven't been able to accomplish in your garden.

You probably know them as greens keepers or golf course suprintendents. But they are much more than this. They are botanists, managers, mechanics, soil scientists and golfers.

A good greens keeper might have a degree from Purdue, Penn State or the University of Guelph.

The greens keeper at the North Halton Golf and Country Club received his first training twenty years ago through the University of Guelph. Alan Beeney has been at the private club since he completed a three-year correspondence course in parks management. Today most greenskeepers take courses in all aspects of golf course management. "I came up an unusual way," Mr. Beeney said.

Mr. Beeney lives on the golf course and sometimes sees a bit too much golf. "Every time I look out my window I see golf," he said. To get away from the game he works in thegarden, practises photography and travels. Travelling is limited to the winter when he manages the club's curling rinks.

In the summer, if the course isn't up to phr. Mr. Beeney can expect to works a week.

A hard winter this year has meant many extra hours work for Mr. Beeney and his crew. As many as 12 people work on the course during the peak periods.

The course is still not in the best shape. Diseases have hurt the grass. "We cut the grass so short. We do unnatural things to it. It is so susceptible," Mr. Beeney sald.

The greens are a particularly sensitive part of the course. Every day they are cut 5/32 to 1/8 of an inch long. If a green is not fast enough lt is cut shorter. "The green is a living thing and disease is very prevalent during this kind of weather," Mr. Beeney said.

A course takes a lot of punishment from disease, weather and golfers. Last year, between April and November, 37,000 golfers played at the Georgetown course.

Despite the wear on the course the grounds crew does get it in the shape they want, but they can't plan on keeping it that way. "Mother Nature has a way of reminding you not to get too cocky," Mr. Beeney said.

Golfers also have a degree of unpredictability. In the twenty years Mr. Beeney has been taking care of the course he has seen the calibre of golf improve. Today golfers hit the bail further, they are better athletes and the equipment is better, he sald.

To keep up with the improved golfer the course must be improved. Five years ago Mr. Beeney was successful in getting the club to approve contoured fairways. Contoured fairways have narrow sections where you are not supposed to hit the ball. and wide sections beyond the narrow where you should. There is more

'Contoured fairways made the course a little harder. It makes it more thinkable and interesting," Mr. Beeney said.

The North Halton Golf and Country Club greens keeper has a master plan for the course. He admits he can't please everyone with his course. Even he is not totally pleased with its design. "Some holes are excellent, others are good. Some golfers have favorite holes, probably the ones they par," he said.




