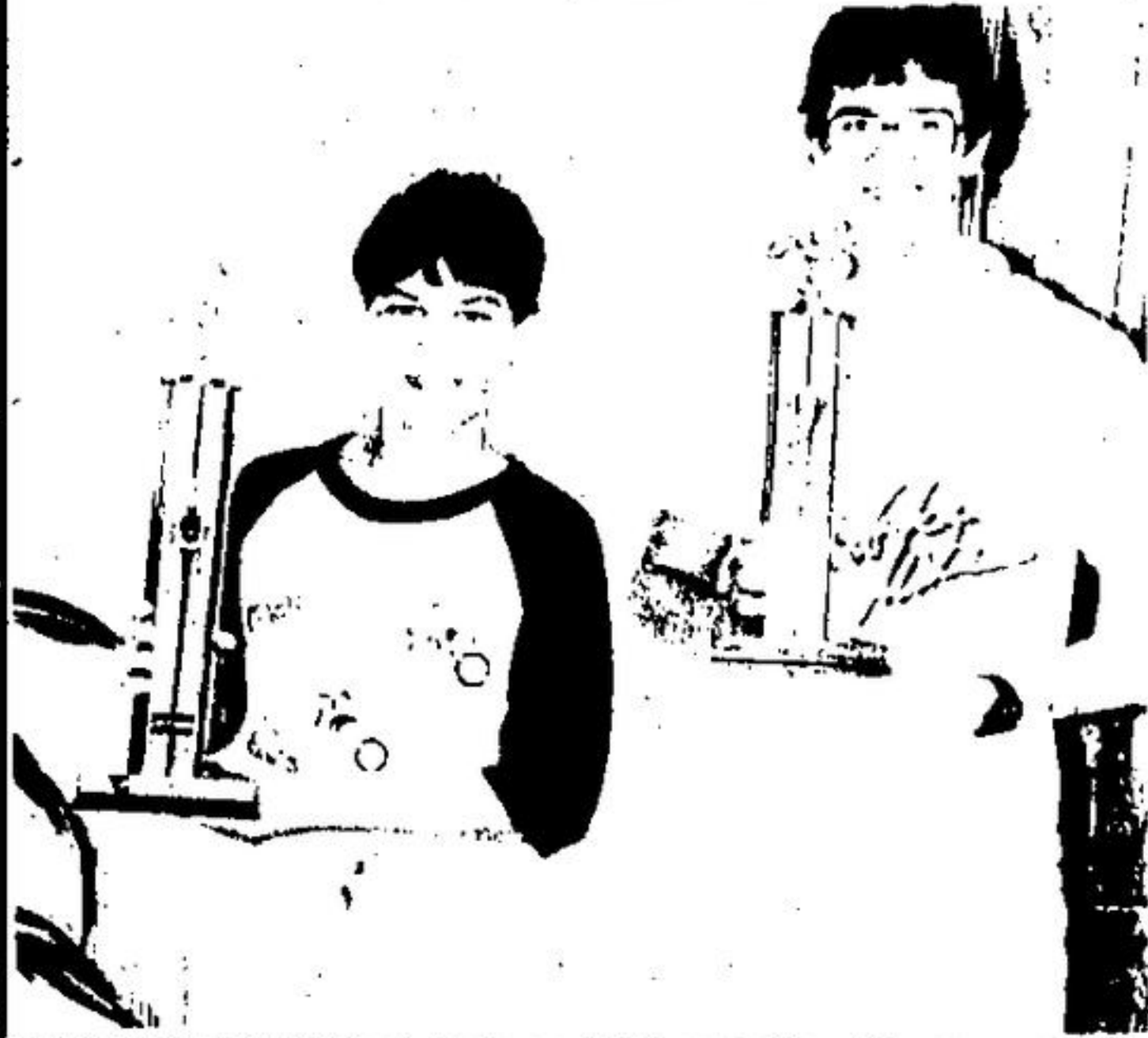
finish. Having finished with a total of 16 points Thompson took home third overall and a nice trophy.
