

Police beat

Assault charge

A Burlington man has been charged with sexually assaulting a 17-year-old Georgetown woman, using the threat of a weapon.

The accused, a teenager, has been released on a promise to appear in Milton Provincial Court Sept. 22.

A complaint was received early Sunday morning and Halton Regional Police conducted an investigation on Maple Avenue.

8 impaired

Halton Regional Police charged eight people with impaired driving last week. One impaired driver, age 36, caused an accident Aug. 16 at 4:40 p.m. near the intersection of John and Church Streets in Acton.

The driver was arrested for an outstanding warrant for an impaired charge in 1983. The Georgetown motorist was held until a bail hearing could be arranged.

Phoney money

During the evening last Tuesday a thief entered an unlocked car and came away with a handful of money.

Fortunately for the car owner, the money was only in Canadian Tire dollars which totalled about \$20 in store merchandise. A can of Scotch Guard was also stolen. The car was parked on Arletta Street.

No locked doors

Friday evening a car owner found himself short of a pair of running shoes, binoculars, and a box of 20 cassette tapes. A thief had entered the car parked on Ontario Street. The merchandise is valued at about \$320.

The car was not locked.

Hospitalized

A collision at the corners of Guelph Street and Mountainview caused \$10,000 damage to two vehicles and two elderly people were taken to hospital.

Last Wednesday Ed Bergman, 74, and Lena Bergman, 74, were sent to Georgetown District Memorial Hospital. They were treated and later released.

Push prank

During the early morning hours of Aug. 12, someone pushed a car onto the street on Dayfoot Drive in Georgetown. There was \$100 damage caused to the car door.

Smashed boat

It's usually car windshields that are the ones to be smashed by vandals. However, a boat owner on Irwin Cres. in Georgetown will need repairs to a windshield that was broken last week, valued at about \$100.

Shoplifting

A youthful female offender was caught shoplifting by staff at a drug store in the Georgetown Marketplace. The accused had taken about \$13 worth of cassette tapes. A court date has been set for Sept. 25.

Fails to yield

A driver was charged with failing to yield after an accident near the intersection of the 10th Line and Steeles Avenue.

One driver was backing a car on to the 10th Line when the vehicle was hit by an oncoming car. A 1982 Dodge received about \$750 worth of damage in the accident, while a 1982 Nissan needed repairs costing about \$3,500.

Leather heist

A leather cover used to protect the front of a car was stolen from a vehicle parked on 46 Guelph Street sometime during the night of Aug. 11. The value of the leather cover is \$175.

Wallet missing

A man's wallet was taken from a car that was parked in Prospect Park in Acton, Aug. 12. The car was not locked and the value of the wallet's contents totalled \$30.

Attempted robbery

An apartment on Church Hill Road South in Acton was the scene of an attempted robbery Thursday evening. However, the person didn't enter the premises. The screen door and door handle were tampered with and damage was estimated at about \$50.

Wood thief

Lumber was taken from a construction site on Wildwood Road sometime between Aug. 8 and Aug. 11. The value of the wood is about \$300.

Stolen goods

A set of trim rings worth about \$200 were stolen from a car dealership on Guelph Street last week. Also, a set of golf clubs were taken from a bag at the Georgetown Golf Club valued at \$450. The clubs were stolen sometime between Aug. 2 and Aug. 11.

Region endorses tourist sign

Campbellville is a touristic area and its businessmen want to help tourists find their way to the picturesque village.

Last week, Halton Region's planning and public works committee gave its okay to putting Campbellville on the Highway 401 and Guelph Line interchange sign.

Ultimately a Ministry of Transportation and Communication decision, Halton's endorsement may carry some weight at the provincial level.

"This time every year, 3,000 people a week are looking for Campbellville," Campbellville Business Association President Tom Thekan told Regional councillors. "Lots of people are getting lost trying to find Regional Road 9 (Sideroad 5) and the Guelph Line intersection."

Coun. Pam Sheldon supported the request, noting Halton has put a great deal of effort into trying to get tourists to Halton.

"Campbellville is one of our biggest draws for the entire north area," she said.

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A slight majority want corner store beer and wine

A slight majority of people who answered a MPP's survey agree with selling wine and beer in corner stores. A 51 per cent bloc of respondents were for the sale of beer and wine in corner stores under controlled conditions. Undecideds registered 5 per cent and the No group numbered 44 per cent.

The survey for Don Knight's Halton-Burlington riding was included in a newsletter to constituents.

The survey indicated that only 30 per cent of his constituents would watch broadcasts of the Ontario Legislature at work if it were shown on local cable television.

On the issue of extra billing, 57.6 per cent said Yes to the question: "Do you agree with the legislation recently introduced to ban extra-billing for physicians' services, dentistry services performed in hospitals and all insured optometry services in Ontario?"

The extra-billing question drew 4.9 Undecideds and 37.5 for the No vote.

Freer trade almost won the support of a majority. There were 48.6 per cent who said Yes to the following question: "Do you agree with negotiations on freer trade with the United States after extensive study of the potential impact on Ontario industry, employment and culture?"

The undecided vote on freer trade was 37.4 per cent while the No vote was 14 per cent.

Another question asked about the concern over the growing industrialization of Halton-Burlington. Some 37.8 per cent of the respondents said they were concerned while 47.7 per cent said no, they were not concerned.

The survey results were printed in the summer '86 newsletter put out by the MPP. Elected members of each political party in the Legislature are entitled to mail out three to the riding per year.

Day care birthday

Sept. 25, the Maple Avenue Day Care Centre in Georgetown will be celebrating its 10th anniversary.

The 100-year old stone farmhouse in which the Centre is housed, was bought by Halton and the province in 1975. The following year, after necessary renovations were undertaken, the 34-day-care space facility opened.

An open house will celebrate this special anniversary at 7 p.m. Sept. 25.

Ministry of Community and Social Services staff, local residents, past students, parents, children and staff are invited to attend.

Building boost for Acton?

In another six to eight weeks, Acton may have more than just Cedar Roads Development Ltd. on the road.

At last week's Regional planning and public works committee meeting, Coun. Rick Bonnette was told it would take another six to eight weeks to see if Civero Developments Limited and other outstanding development applications can also go ahead.

The Ministry of the Environment has released Cedar Roads from a development condition requiring the water supply problem in Acton be resolved. The Ministry is allowing the 13-home subdivision to go ahead near the Acton High School, accepting there is enough water in the town to support it.

Regional Public Works Director Bob Moore said discussions will be ongoing with the Ministry to see if other development applications currently on hold because of Acton's water shortage, can go ahead for the same reasons as the Cedar Roads application. He anticipated the discussions will take up to two months to bring results.

"More and more it's getting positive," Coun. Bonnette said, praising the Regional Chairman for his help.

- Have been continuously assessed as the owner of residential real property in the Town of Halton Hills for not less than 5 years immediately preceding September 1st, 1986.


