AIDS policy for Halton Region

Halton Region has a prepared policy for dealing with AIDS in its schools even though it has no reported cases to which the policy will apply.

Medical Officer of Health Dr. Graham Pollett said the policy was prepared as a precaution so authorities will be ready if any victims or carriers are identified in the system.

Under the policy the MOH will assess each case individually and infected individuals will only continue to work or attend classes on his recommendation. If it is determined that special arrangements are required to permit this continued attendance, the MOH will make the school principal aware of the situation.

Because the risk of infection is low among social contacts of AIDS patients and carriers, other school staff and parents will only be notified if necessary.

The policy suggests the use of two-way masks in administering mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, but stresses the unlikelihood of contracting AIDS in such a fashion.

Dr. Pollett said the victim who is ill enough with AIDS to suffer a cardiac arrest from AIDS, is too ill to be in school. The first-aiders must be more concerned with the lasting damage which might result from not proffering help than with risk to his own health.

Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy questioned the wisdom of

concealing the fact a student has AIDS from the parents of the student's classmates.

"Supposing I had a homosexual son in school and you knew there was an AIDS carrier in that school and that he was also a homosexual," Mr. Pomeroy said. "What right have I as a parent to know about that?"

Dr. Pollett said the maturity of the individual would be the determining factor. If the individual was judged capable of acting in a responsible manner about his condition he would be allowed to remain in school. If he were considered irresponsible or too immature to be reliable, then he would be removed from school.

"I believe any error that was made would be on the conservative side," Dr. Pollett said.

Even the parents of an AIDS victim over age 12 will not be notified of

his condition unless he gives his consent or the MOH feels there is danger of the victim failing to comply with the MOH's directions.

Halton Hills Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson questioned the wisdom of giving such strict confidentiality to victims over the age of majority.

Milton Mayor Gordon Krantz was of the opposite view, questioning the wisdom of constant media mention of the dangers of AIDS. He felt society may be overreacting in its effort to protect people, thereby endangering the lives of accident victims because first-aiders fear AIDS.

The Region's policy calls for increased public education and updated information about the disease. School students will receive that training and information through health nurses.
