Delrex deadlocked with Corrigan after win

DELREX SMOKE SHOP VS CORRIGAN INSTRUMENT

they have displayed something of the old spark that propelled them to so many division titles in the past. With the win they have quietly moved into first place with Corrigan in

the East. The Smoker defence made the difference in the game. Interceptions by Doug Thompson (with two), Doug Getty and Steve Frost stymied the Corrigan attack. The Smoker offence was supplied by John Vierra with a pair of majors and Terry Diardichuk, Thompson and Howard Ferguson with one each. Diardichuk also snared a two-point convert.

Brent Ferguson, who upped his league-leading scoring stats with a pair of majors. Hugo Dillfach and Kevin Harrison also scored majors. Harrison and Brian King chipped in two-point converts.

Acton A's drew first blood in their opening game of their best-of-five Intercounty Football League playoff series with Hornby Monday night at Prospect Park.

Acton notched a 5-4 win as a three-run second inning paced the A's to the victory. Down 2-0 on a Larry Withnell homer and Tim Lamars scoring on a couple of errors, the A's came back in the second with the three runs courtesy of Mark Hirtle and Kelly McArthur four-baggers. Hirtle's shot came with Gary Halls at first.

Acton had two more runs in the fifth inning when Greg Voisin homered with Glen Scott at first to go up 5-2. Hornby came back with two runs in the seventh as Lamars walked, went to second on Larry Richardson's single. Both scored when Russ Price hit a double.

Halls took the win for Acton, going six full innings. He allowed five hits, walked on and fanned 9. Hirtle came in relief, and allowed just two hits while fanning five and walking on. Mark Curtis took the loss for Hornby, going the distance. Curtis allowed seven hits, fanned 14 and gave up four walks.

Game Two in the series was played last night, and Games Three and Four will go Monday in Acton and Tuesday back in Hornby. If a fifth game is required a date will be then set.

Acton manager Steve Marshall said he was pleased with Halls' pitching performance and expects a close series.

"It's going to be close all the way through," he said. "I think it will be a matter of who plays the better defence."

Acton finished second in the Intercounty loop with an 8-3 win over Hornby last Tuesday night in Hornby.
