"Greeks" humiliated once again

The biggest news to come out of the second-last day of the GFFL regular season was the Corrigan Instrument demolition of O'Tooles. The "Greeks" were humiliated 58-14 by the Instrument crew. In another game Dairy Queen and Norval. teams at the opposite end of the GFFL hierarchy, clashed and the result was a predictable 51-0 triumph for the Queens. Other action saw Longhorns up their record to 11-1 by defeating M and M Pro Sports 28-6, Smokers beat Peel County Bandits 29-9 and North Halton Sports topped Karry Kitchens 35-19. In one of the most devastating attacks ever in GFFL history, Corrigan unleashed a blitzkrieg of eight touchdowns and four two-point converts to crush an inept O'Toole squad. Four Corrigan players scored a pair of TDs each: John Larose, Kevin Harrison, Mike Milton and Brent Ferguson: Scoring leader Ferguson now had 105 points on the season and a 25-point cushion on his nearest rival Jim Lindsay. On this day though, Ferguson's heroics were eclipsed by teammate Harrison. Along with his two majors Harrison scored three two-point converts and kicked a single for 19 points in the game. Brian (Butchy) King rounded out Corrigan scoring with a two-point convert. Corrigan now has scored more points than any team but Dairy Queen, but still have to prove they have what it takes to beat the top GFFL teams.

The few loyal "Greeks" have been let down all season by the no-shows of some of their top players. They promise to be better in the playoffs with all hands present, but after allowing 110 points in their last two games it's doubtful that even a full squad can save them from playoff elimination. Moe Rivers and Danny Reynolds scored O'Toole majors. Frank Miedzinski tallied for a twopoint convert.

DAIRY QUEEN VS NORVAL The well-oiled Queen machine tuned up for the pivotal Sept. 7 showdown with Longhorns by whitewashing the boys from Norval. The Queen offence steamrolled the Charlie Brown squad with seven majors and four two-point converts and now have recorded 417-points over the season, an outstanding average of 35 points' per game. Gary Lockwood potted a pair of majors and Lloyd Miezanic, Jeff Lockwood, Steve Crossman, Hal Hulme and Lockwood all had singles. Hulme, Stu Lunn, Mitch Leblanc and Dan Martin added two-point converts. Dairy Queen remains deadlocked atop the standings with Longhorns, who defeated M and M Pro Sports. On Sept. 7 the two teams meet at 12:30 p.m. in a contest that will decide first place and offer a preview of the probable championship game.

Longhorns held on to their share of first place in the GFFL by pummelling M and M Pro Sports. The contest was tight in the first half as the teams exchanged majors. Brian Kemp scored for Pro Sports and Mark Hamilton for the cattle. In the second half however, the Longhorns shot ahead with TDs from Rob Hamilton, Mike McCandless and another by Mark Hamilton. Meet learning one for cyclist Cleary

This weekend was a learning experience for cyclist Dermot Cleary.

First of all the 25-year-old Georgetown native had his kilometre time thrown out from Friday evening. The reason being a few of the riders weren't able to ride Friday night due to darkness. Riding rules dictate all competitors must take part under the same conditions. Therefore, all times recorded Friday didn't count. Cleary had a personal best time of 1.18.88 (9th best) but decided Saturday to forego the kilometre event as he had a pursuit race later that day.

Secondly, while preparing for the pursuit event Cleary found out he was to compete just five minutes prior to the start of his race. That meant Cleary wasn't able to warm up properly, change into his pursuit skin suit and remember to fill up his back tire. While having stored his blke before the competition, Cleary



had taken some of the air out of his rear tire, a common cycling prac-

In addition an inferior pursuit opponent didn't push Cleary enough, and the stiff wind and rainy weather proved costly as the Georgetown rider tried to go out too fast early. As, a result Cleary was tired at the end of the race, and it came back to haunt him as Cleary's time of 5.44.70, while a personal best on the Delhi track, missed qualifying for the final by just eight tenths of a second. Cleary went out fast in an attempt to match the National Standard time. If he did, Cleary would qualify for the Canadian champion-

Cleary felt if he had been able to change into the pursuit skin suit, he could have qualified for the pursuit final. Cleary said the suit takes at least a full second off one's time.

"It was a combination of the weather and me not following mylap schedule," Cleary said. "I went out three seconds too last on my first tap which was suicidal. It was a mistake on my part and it cost me dearly because I didn't make the finals. I felt I belonged in the middle of the eight who qualified.

"It's a bitter pill to swallow but I'll never make that mistake again of going ahead of my lap schedule," Cleary added. "I was chomping at the bit and wanted to go for it."

All in ali, Cleary was naturally disappointed with the weekend. Continued on page C2


