

## Diving courses gaining popularity

It appears the sport of SCUBA diving is gaining in popularity in Halton

Joe Letts has seen enrolment in his instruction course increase to a point where now he has had to turn away some people for the upcoming Fall season. It's a situation Letts is happy to be in.

"I'm very pleased to see it going." Letts said. "Everything has its safety quirks but you can remove 99 per cent of the quirks with education and knowing your limitations. It's when you start pushing past where you should be that the risk curve goes up. I've spent over 3,000 hours underwater with no more incidents."

This Fall (starting next month at the Georgetown indoor pool) Letts will have two sessions which are filled with the 12 needed students. In all Letts is hoping to offer a total of six sessions by this time next year (two in Winter and two in Spring), which is up from the one offered last year and two offered two years ago.

Letts contributes the rise in SCUBA (Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) diving popularity here to a combination of lactors. First of all his advertising campaign was presented in more of a professional manner and secondly people are seeing the physical fitness benefits of diving, and that it's an activity invariably the whole family can get involved with.

"Diving is an activity that is so easy to become a family activity," Letts said.

Letts' course offers students the basics needed in the sport. In addition to classroom time where theory and audio-visual material is presented, students spend time in the pool practising what they've learned in class. Letts teaches an eight-week Association of Canada Underwater Council program which also includes three open water dives before students become certified.

Letts too has increased his equipment availability to students since

the course's inception. Now each student has his/her own tanks and regulators to use while in the pool, In the past, a pair had to share the equipment.

Letts has also managed to form a club last year made up of about 12 local diving enthusiasts who have come up through the ranks of previous Letts' diving courses. The club goes out on dives in the area, and observe wrecks. This year the club went to Tobermory and took part in a couple of deep dives (130-150 feet) and observed the wrecks of The Arabia and The Forest City.

All course graduates automatically become Club members, and can save money in terms of renting equipment. It would cost a person about \$800-\$1,200 to outfit himself in decent diving gear. However, club members can rent equipment for \$35 a weekend and the equipment is checked and maintained by the

In addition to building a strong local club, Letts would like to offer snorkel diving to youth groups around town. He said the snorkel program can be implemented for Cubs, Brownies and even the han-

"I think it could fit into a rehabilitation sort of program." Letts said. "If a handicapped person needs something of a challenge this would be uncomplicated enough to provide that challenge to keep him motivated.

"Eventually I'd like to see a club that's a strong club," Letts continued. "I'd like to get a club that's always doing something so the community knows it's there."


