Kemp, knowing this, has worked hard this summer preparing for camp. As usual he attended Dave Tataryn's Hockey School in June, then lifted weights and ran before working at a pair of hockey camps in early August. The past few weeks Kemp has tended goal in pickup games played daily at Meadowvale's Four Rinks facility. The likes of Wendell Clark (Toronto Maple Leafs), Paul Coffey (Edmonton Oilers), Rob Whistle (New York Rangers), Russ Courtnall (Toronto Maple Leafs) and Tim Bernhart (Toronto Maple Leafs) have also taken part in the Meadowvale sessions in preparation for their respective teams' camps. In fact Kemp's play in Meadowvale has Bernhart possibly interested in attending Tataryn's camp next summer.
