Classical guitarists are heard worldwide

It's more relaxing than a Sony Walkman. Classical guitarists Donald Wilson and Peter McAllister are coming to town Oct. 19.

Their noon hour Sunday show promises to be enchanting and tranquil - everything you wanted for a quiet fall day.

The duo will be at the Halton Hills cultural centre as part of the Festival Five celebrations. Before the concert, patrons will be treated to a late morning brunch of quiche, salads, muffins, coffee cake and beverages. Tickets cost \$10 and are available from the Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department on James Street in Georgetown.

Festival Five is a week-long program to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the opening of the Halton Hills Library-Cultural Centre.

Thanks to some help from Mold Masters Ltd. of Georgetown, expenses for the concert have been reduced.

The Wilson-McAllister duo have given more than 100 recitals in Europe and have been heard on many radio networks such as the BBC and Radio France.

Their first album, Duets for Spanish Guitars, has been released on the Fanfare label.

The duo joined together in 1977 upon graduating from the Faculty of Music at the University of Toronto, where they studied guitar with Eli Kassner.
