## Halton Family Services helps individuals, groups

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The Herald has agreed to publish a series of columns about member agencies participating in the Halton Hills United Way campaign. This fall is the first year the town has had a United Way. These stories will allow readers a chance to see where their donations will be going in the way of programs and services.

Halton Family Services offers individual counselling of children and adults, marital, family and group counselling, employee assistance programs, credit counselling and family life education.

In response to the rapidly growing need for counselling in the region, Halton Family Services' staff has grown from 6 in 1978 to 24 in 1986. In 1987, the agency expects to provide more than 8,000 counselling sessions.



United Way

Halton Family Services is staffed by highly trained professional social workers. No referral is necessary; anyone seeking counselling may simply call for an appointment.

Halton Family Services has been helping people of Halton since 1954. In addition to the Acton office, the agency has offices in Burlington, Milton and Oakville. Halton Family Services is a member of the Ontario Association of Family Service Agencies and Family Services Canada, and is Accredited by the Ontario Association of Family Service Agencies.

### \$1 million ceiling

Having a ceiling of \$1 million on the amount of any liability insurance claim against the town sits right with town councillors.

Monday night, council supported a petition by the Corporation of the Township of Oxford-on-Rideau council which asks the Minister of Municipal Affairs to bring in legislation setting a limit on liability insurance claims.

The Township of Oxford-on-Rideau is in Oxford Mills, Ontario.

Its petition notes municipal liability insurance rates have risen so high they've become a burden to municipalities and non-profit agencies. It's caused programs to be discontinued and has detrimentally affected the quality of life for residents, says the petition Halton Hills council endorsed.

### Wildwood meeting

Town engineering staff will hold their first public meeting in Glen Williams on reconstruction options for Wildwood Road. Oct. 23, you'll be welcome to take a look at what choices the town is considering for road and storm sewer designs on Wildwood.

### Car vandalized

A car parked on Highway 7 at the Fifth Line, where there was a party Saturday night, received \$1,500 in damage. The roof, trunk, hood and right side of the 1975 Oldsmobile were kicked in, police said.

### Car stereo stolen

A coat hanger was used to get inside a car from which a stereo was stolen Thursday night. The car stereo worth \$300 was taken from a car parked at Mill Street and Charles Street in Georgetown.

## \$88,000 spent to pay for temporary employees

Do you know how much Halton Region spends annually on temporary help?

According to the Region's Treasurer Joe Rinaldo, Halton spends \$88,000 on temporary help for its various departments and Halton Regional Police.

The Region's administration and finance department last week accepted the services of Cheryl Craig Careers Inc. of Burlington to supply the Region with temporary help.

The temporary help ranges from statistical typists at \$8.75 an hour to an intermediate AES operator at \$11.45 an hour or unskilled laborer at \$7.50 an hour.
