Go away rain

BALLINAFAD - Let us hope the month of October will give us more reasonable weather. Rain, rain and more rain seems to have been the pattern for the last few weeks, with heavy rain and thunderstorms. The Monday storm seems to be a little bit more severe than the recent ones.

Mission impossible

An application by a Terra Cotta man to enclose a breezeway and raise a garage to make an addition to his home has been deferred to a hearing by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

Authority staff don't think it's possible to adequately or reasonably floodproof the additions proposed by J.A. McIntyre of Winston Churchill Boulevard, Part Lot 26, Con. 11. Mr. McIntyre's plans were submitted Aug. 6.

\$7.3 million to reduce flooding damages

A study commissioned by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority estimates it will take \$7.3 million to protect flood-prone areas.

Dealing with towns on the Credit River watershed within its jurisdiction, the CVCA report outlines damage estimates for 21 communities or "damage centres".

The figure of \$7.3 million is what it will cost to do remedial work for what is classified as regional flood protection. Regional storm flows were calculated assuming another Hurricane Hazel was centred over the Credit River watershed.

Consultants for Philips Planning and Engineering Limited estimated the amount of flood damage by surveying buildings located within the regional storm floodline.

An estimated \$810,000 is required to reduce flood damage in Glen Williams mainly through additional dyking.

In Norval the cost of improvements for dyking total \$490,000 while the cost in Acton for dyking and floodproofing is listed at \$210,000.

The area by the Norval trailer park was recommended for \$400,000 worth of remedial work while other parts of Georgetown need \$10,000 worth of improvement, according to the report.

Dyking and land acquisition are two types of remedial work suggested for Stewarttown, which requires estimated improvements worth \$110,000.

Terra Cotta could use \$370,000 for flood damage improvements in the way of dyking and Belfountain could use \$75,000 for remedial work.

The report also lists what it would cost to prepare for averting damage if a 100-year flood were to hit the area. A 100-year flood is considered to be less damaging than a regional storm the size of Hurricane Hazel.

The report notes the CVCA has been effective in eliminating new building in the lower Credit floodplain, thereby helping to minimize damage in areas south of Highway 401.
