

## Georgetown juniors win top honors

# Rebels take tourney crown

The implementation of a pressure defence with just over six minutes left to play lifted Georgetown District High School junior girls basketball team past Stayner in the final of a tournament played at the Georgetown gym Saturday.

The Rebels trailed 24-20 when coach Moe Leeking called time out and put the pressure defence into his team's game plan. The move worked as the Rebels forced turnovers which were cashed into points via the fast break. The end result was a 39-28 win for Georgetown.

"We put it in to see if they (Stayner) could stay up with us,"

Leeking said. "They had just lost a guard to fouls and I called the time out because we were running around a bit."

Tara Burroughs held the hot hand for Georgetown with 21 points. Marye Boks had six while Jenny Irwin and Cindy Kallo both had four points each.

What made the win even more impressive was that the Stayner team was made up of older players than were on the Rebels squad. In Simcoe County league play the junior players can play for one more year than junior players in Halton can.

Pearson beat Milton 33-26 in the

consolation final.

Georgetown began the tournament in fine form defeating Milton 39-8. In that game Burroughs had 13 points to lead the Rebels while Boks had eight and Martha McClure chipped in with six points.

Georgetown met Loyola in the second contest, and came away with a 44-18 decision. Burroughs and Lisa Carter had nine points each while Irwin and McClure both had five points.

The Rebels' Burroughs was named the tournament MVP and was named to the all-star squad along with teammate Heather Lawrence.

A total of eight teams took part in the tournament. They were: Loyola, E.C. Drury, King City, Central Peel, Stayner, Lester B. Pearson, Milton District as well as the host Rebels team.

The junior squad will open its season today with an away game at Perdue. Coach Leeking knows league rivals will be aiming for his team this year as the Rebels defend their Halton title.

"I'm glad we got in a lot of exhibition games (five)," he said. "We've gotten over the cobwebs stage in the gym and we're court-ready. Our immediate needs are to work the ball as a team on offence and improve our foul shooting. We haven't had time to work on that because we've spent a lot of time getting our defence set."

Leeking said he probably has more bench depth this season than he did last year. When the situation requires it, Leeking will have 10 players who could be inserted into a game and make a contribution.

But Leeking remains non-committal about his team's chances of repeating as champions.

"We'll be competitive," he said.

By-Law No. 84-106 of the Town of Halton Hills and Section 37 (3) of The Game and Fish Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 182, as amended, permits municipalities in regulated areas to charge fees and issue licenses for the hunting of rabbits and pheasants in the open season:
