GINGERBREAD

- •1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar •2 eggs
- •1/2 cup molasses
- •1/2 ISP, Sait
- •1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- •¹/₂ tsp; nutmeg 1/2 Isp. ginger
- •1 tsp. baking powder
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- •2/3 cup boiling water

• 1 tsp soda

Cream shortening and sugar; add molasses, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon. Pour boiling water over 1 level teaspoon baking soda and add to first mixture. Add flour which has been silted with baking powder and ginger; add eggs, well beaten. Beat well. Pour into well-greased

325 to 350° about 40 minutes or
