# Sr. Redmen undefeated

Acton High School's senior girls basketball team racked up its third straight East Hallowin win last week in convincing fashion.

The Redmen scored a 54-21 win over the visiting Loyola squad. Actually, Wednesday's game at the Acton gym was for all intent and pur-

poses over in the first quarter as Acton stormed out to a 20-4 advantage. It was at that time McLaren and co-coach Anne Andrews decided to take the starters out and give other players court time. The only facet of the game plan kept by Acton was running the fast break whenever the

opportunity presented itself. The reason being McLaren wants his club to be able to execute the break and abandoning it might result in some rustiness.

Once Acton's opponents fell behind they tried to apply full-court pressure, which Acton was able to break consistently.

Their (Loyola) ideas were right, but their feet were slow," McLaren said. "Our kids too have had a lot of that (facing pressure defences and presses) this year."

Susan Craig had another good night scoring, leading Acton with 22 points. Also contributing to the win with good efforts were Carolynne Hoare, Linda Bottero, Diane Hancock and Lee Anne Johnson.

McLaren said what has impressed him so far this year about his squad has been its unselfishness. He said all five players on the court are more interested in the team scoring points and look for the best chance to net buckets.

Acton faces E.C. Drury today (there and white Oaks Monday, before going for a showdown with the three better East Hallowin squads. The Redmen host Georgetown (Oct. 22) and Queen Elizabeth Park (Oct. 23) before finishing the season at Milton. The trio of games has the Redmen squad in a situation where it can decide its own fate in the standings.

"Those are big games," McLaren said. "The girls too are looking forward to them. I've found our kids play better against the better teams with athletic ability. Now is the time where we begin to insert things into our areas of concern."

## Acton juniors survive rally to record basketball victory

Acton Redmen junior girls basketball team survived a late comeback to nlp Loyola 26-25 in an East Hallowin game played last week at the Acton High School gym.

Acton led 24-18 with just over five minutes left in the game when Loyola began to creep back into the contest. With 1:34 left Loyola managed to tie it up 24-24 and took a one point lead via the free throw line with 56 seconds to play.

However, fine ball movement resulted in Shannon Burrell nailing the winning field goal with just 35 seconds left to play as Acton took the 26-25 lead. Loyola tied the ball up with four seconds left to play and with the possession arrow in their favor, had one last chance to take the win. But the last second attempt wasn't close and Acton had their second win in three games.

Acton had to go down the wire without the services of Melissa Cor-

son, who had fouled out in the third quarter.

Redmen coach Lyn McLaren said his club had the opportunity to put the game away early, but missing good chances resulted in the game being that much closer.

"Our kids had good shots but we didn't shoot well," McLaren said. "But in another two weeks or so this club is going to be a different team. The key is having patience."

Jennifer Scott led the Redmen offensively with 16 points. Burrell's winning field goal gave her eight points on the evening.

Today Acton travels to E.C. Drury for a game there. McLaren said traditionally Drury has played his Acton teams tough so he isn't taking the contest lightly.

"It will be a tough game," he said.

## Rebels defeated in football opener

Georgetown District High School junior boys football team began its season last week on a sour note.

The Rebels dropped a 35-12 decision to Aldershot Wednesday afternoon in a Tier II contest played at the Georgetown gym. The game was the first of the year for the Rebels, who had a pair of contests postponed prior to Wednesday's encounter.

Aldershot, who played Tier I football last season, took advantage of Georgetown turnovers in the first half to take a 28-0 lead before Rebels mounted a 14-play drive late in the second quarter that resulted in Stuart Teetzel's fine six-yard touchdown run. In the second half defensive back Derek Orme took an interception 85 yards for his team's second major of the day. Although Teetzel didn't score on the play, he provided Orme with the block at the Aldershot 30-yard line which ensured the interception major.

Wednesday's game also featured some classless moves by the visiting Aldershot squad. With the score 28-0 in the first half, Aldershot attempted a short-kickoff not once, but twice (and were unsuccessful). Also, the visitors were quite inept with the late hit, which for the most part went undetected.

Rebels' coach Rick Redshaw wasn't pleased with the on-side kickoffs, but said maybe Aldershot's coach had a reason for them. "The only thing I can say is maybe he was giving his first-string one last chance with the ball," Redshaw said. "But the chances were slim that we were going to come back."

Prior to the contest Aldershot also said all offensive linemen had to be wearing numbers in the 40-60 range.

In Tier II football coaches are alternating players at all positions and it's difficult to outfit players with appropriate numbers.

Despite the loss Redshaw said his defence played well when it came to stopping Aldershot's inside running game. What hurt the Rebels was the sweep where Aldershot's speed proved quite difficult for Georgetown to stop.

"It was our inexperience on the outside," Redshaw said. "But our defence ended in an up note (with touchdowns) and it made some good tackles."

Offensively Rebel running backs Kirk Serjeantson and Tim Racinsky ran well. Redshaw platooned Colin Murray and Sandor Gombocz at quarterback, both of whom faced heavy defensive pressure from Aldershot when trying to pass. Despite that, both quarterbacks showed enough savvy to throw to areas where the receivers were to be. The offence also featured a double reverse with Orme handing off to Teetzel that worked well.

Georgetown travels to Pearson and then hosts E.C. Drury Monday for the makeup game between the two schools. Georgetown could invariably come up with a pair of wins in the contests if the Rebels play good football.

"This year there is a lot more (talent) there," Redshaw said. "The only thing we'll change on offence is put end Brad Phee on the line. On defence we'll use Stuart Teetzel's speed in the defensive backfield and will put Mike Da Silva in as an inside linebacker and move Rob Reid on to the defensive line."

## Minor peewees off with good beginning

Travelling to Brampton the locals skated hard with end-to-end action by both clubs resulting in a seesaw battle which ended in a 5-5 tie. Steve Wright was injured after going into the boards heavily in the second period but nothing too serious was found after a checkup at the hospital. The team is looking forward to having him back in couple of games. David Frost also played well between the pipes in the tie.

Game Two pitted Georgetown against Chinguacousy and the locals proved to be an overpowering force with an impressive 7-3 win. Body contact is new this year and all the team members are experimenting, some successfully and some not so much so, but all the boys seem to be enjoying it. Markers went to Jeff

Wright, who had two, and Ken Kosziwka, who had his first hattrick of the year. Dobbin and Curry had the others. Assists went to Kosziwka (2), Jeff Wright (2), Kevin Patrick (2), Curry, Jake Mashinter, Pells and Jason Gratto. Goalie Marc St. Pierre made some good saves in a much deserved win for the team.

Thursday night Georgetown hosted Flamboro in a fast, hard-checking contest.

The first two periods saw end-to-end action with Georgetown taking a 2-1 lead on goals from Shawn Pearson (unassisted) and Kurnell (from Mashinter).

In a penalty-filled final frame Flamboro tied it up. With 2:22 left play Presswood set up by Dobbin netted the winner in a 3-2 contest.
