Kewley pleased with field hockey Rebels

The Georgetown District High School girls field hockey squad finished their season on a winning note this weekend at the School Girls Conference tournament held in Toronto.

The Rebels compiled a 2-1-2 record through the round-robin to finish first in their pool. The locals started the tournament off on the right foot with a 2-0 win over Kingston's Bay Ridge as Vicky Lavallee had both Rebels goals.

The Georgetown team then played to a pair of scoreless draws in their next two games with Orangeville and Bramalea. Lavallee again had the Rebels' scoring touch against Pickering as her tally proved to be the winner in a 1-0 victory. However, Georgetown ended the tournament on a losing note, dropping a 2-0 decision to Bishop Strachan.

"The girls played well," commented Rebels' coach Sheena Kewley. "They improved each time out."

A major accomplishment was recorded by two Rebels as both Lavallee and Becky Dobbin were invited for the 1987 provincial team tryouts to be held later next month.

The Rebels ended their East Halton season a couple of weeks ago, narrowly missing a playoff berth. Still, Kewley was pleased with her club's 2-2-2 record because of the 20 team members a total of 14 were in their first year of competition.

"I'm very satisfied," she said. "We developed into a team, and the girls were so willing to learn."

Georgetown will lose both Laura Richardson and Pam Meekin for next year, but a total of 18 players are eligible to return in 1987.

"With 18 players returning it really looks good for next year," Kewley said.

Rebel volleyball teams winning

The two boys volleyball teams at Georgetown District High School have extended their unbeaten streaks this past week.

The senior squad recorded wins over White Oaks and Milton to run its record to 6-0 to date. That's good enough for top spot in the East Halton standings.

While the White Oaks scores weren't available, Georgetown easily defeated Milton 15-1, 15-5.

The junior squad too recorded a pair of wins over White Oaks and Milton to run its record to 7-0. Friday against Milton Georgetown swept the series 3-0 (15-3, 15-3, 15-6). Rebels coach Bub McKay was surprised at the easiness with which his club handled Milton because the Mustangs were a big team.

"Milton looked big but they didn't move the ball well on the court," McKay said. "I was expecting a tougher match because Milton had beaten us in a game when we played them in our tournament recently.

They were as big if not bigger than we were."

McKay had his regulars playing in the first two games, but the Rebel coach substituted fully in the third game while Milton left many of their starters in. Still, the Rebels were able to serve well and record the sweep.

With an unblemished record in date, McKay said he's somewhat concerned that his club hasn't been really pushed so far this year.

"I am concerned with the lack of competition," he said. "I'm not down-grading the other schools' programs. It just seems to be a rebuilding year for many other programs."

"We served 98 per cent against Milton and have to show we can beat the good schools," McKay said.

The junior squad will play its final two regular season games this week. Today the Rebels host Loyola, and Monday Georgetown travels to take on Bishop Reding Royals.

Senior Redmen team facing tough opponents

Starting today Acton High School senior girls basketball team will face three of its biggest challenges of the current East Halton season.

Acton hosts Georgetown Rebels today, then will take on Queen Elizabeth Park Monday at the Acton gym. A week from today Acton will travel to play Milton. All three contests are against what is regarded as the finest trio of clubs in East Halton senior ranks. Acton, currently undefeated at 4-0, will have an opportunity of seeing how it stacks up with these clubs and can control its destiny in terms of where it finishes in the final standings.

Currently Acton's next three opponents have a combined record of 10-2 (Milton and Georgetown are 3-1 while QEP is 4-0. NOTE: that is games up to last Monday). Hedmen

coach Lyn McLaren is looking forward to the upcoming contests, as are team members.

"We haven't played really anyone with potential," McLaren said. "I think the time has come. I know the kids are looking forward to the games as much as the coaches are. They want to know where they're at. It's my guess that Wednesday-Monday-Wednesday (dates of three games) will tell the tale."

McLaren feels his team's strongest attribute will be its unselfishness. No longer can a team solely attempt to corral Redmen leading scorer Susan Craig to claim victory. Now if a club tries to, the other Redmen starters can come back and hurt the opposition.

"Our strength is total unselfishness and the ball moves," McLaren said. "Susan is getting tremendous help from the likes of Margie Parker, Kim Hagen, Linda Bottero and Lee Anne Johnson. Also, Carolynne Hoare has come along quite well. Teams can't key on her (Craig) solely anymore."

Acton geared up for the upcoming games in a somewhat subpar way last week. The Redmen defeated E.C. Drury 42-16, but McLaren isn't worried because when the chips are down he's confident his club can respond well.

"Drury beat us to the ball and out-rebounded us, but I think the kids knew they could beat them and relaxed a bit," McLaren said. "I'm looking forward to it (next three games). I'm not overconfident but just pleased that we're in there."

Craig led the way for Acton with 12 points while Johnson and Bottero both had eight. Monday Acton hosted Oakville-Trafalgar.

Total team effort earns Rebels basketball win over White Oaks

The Georgetown District High School senior girls basketball squad had a total team effort last week and as a result came away with another win in East Halton play.

The Rebels defeated White Oaks 33-27 in a game played at the Georgetown gym. The win lifted Georgetown to 2-1 this season with the Rebels having hosted Loyola Monday.

Georgetown was in control of the White Oaks contest as the Rebels led 23-8 at the half. However, White Oaks got back into the game in the third quarter as Georgetown was

unable to net even a point. But Georgetown was able to outscore the visitors 10-9 in the final frame to notch the victory.

Rebels' coach Meredith Smye was able to substitute freely throughout, ensuring some of her younger players get valuable playing time. Chris Harris led the way offensively with 10 points.

"It was a total team effort," Smye commented. "We were trying to work on our fast break and we wanted to play everyone and we did. White Oaks was very controlled and had some good outside shooters."

Getting as many people into the contest was important for Smye and the Rebels. The Georgetown coach said she would like to have as many people as is possible capable of stepping into the starting lineup whenever different situations present themselves.

"I'd like to see us have seven or eight (people who could start at any time) because we like to use pressure and you need the bodies to get that in there," Smye said.

The Rebels face a tough contest today as Georgetown travels to Acton for a match with the Redmen. With Acton being undefeated (at least as of Monday), a win for Georgetown would help the Rebels in their quest to finish as high in the standings as is possible.

However, Smye said her troops weren't looking past Loyola (Monday's game). When the Acton contest comes, that's when the Rebels will begin preparing for it.

"We're taking it one game at a time," she said. "We really want to do well but we want to get as much game experience as we can."

Jr. Redmen's third win impressive to coach

Acton junior Redmen came up with their third win in four East Halton girls basketball contests that has coach Lyn McLaren quite pleased.

The Redmen defeated E.C. Drury 34-29, but what impressed McLaren the most was the cohesiveness his team is developing in what's a rebuilding year for the Redmen squad.

"They're starting to pull together and Jennifer Scott is becoming the glue," he said. "I'm so pleased with my kids. They're improving, are a treat to work with and have tremendous dedication, win, lose or draw. I've got four starters returning next year so I'm looking forward to that too."

Shannon Burrell and Scott led the way for Acton with 10 points each. Angela Dunn chipped in with eight.

The win lifts Acton to a 3-1 record so far this season, but a major test will come up for the Redmen today. Georgetown District High School Rebels, 4-0 this year and defending Halton champs, are in Acton to take on the Redmen at the Acton gym. McLaren knows it will be a tough contest for his club.

"I think there's no doubt that we have to go right at them," McLaren said. "They are the class."

With three games left in their season, the Redmen could still finish the year with a winning record. Such a feat would ensure a playoff berth for Acton, which would be icing on the cake for McLaren, co-coach Anne Andrews and the Redmen team.

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Reding runners place in first Halton meet

Bishop Reding Catholic secondary school had a fine showing in its first-ever Halton cross country championships last week.

The Royals, competing only at the midlevel, took home third spot overall in the girls class and fourth overall in the boys' event. Those

placings pleased coach Maureen Morrison.

"I'm really, really happy for this being our first year," she said. "Our kids ran well."

Individually Mike Wyman was the top Royal, finishing fifth in the midlevel boys' 5 kilometre event. Teammates Jonathan Hodge (20th), Jim Lawrence (26th), Andrew Hodge (30th), Mark Edwards (31st) and Giles Hodge (33rd) completed the Royals' competitors. Bishop Reding's top four finishers combined for 80 points, which put the Royals in fourth, but only one point behind Burlington's Nelson High School in the fight for third spot. Georgetown won the class with 27 points and E.C. Drury was second with 34 points.

The midlevel girls contingent finished third overall, just 11 points behind Assumption's second-place squad. Again Georgetown led the way with top honors.

Individually Kathryn Tannoek was the top Royal finisher with a seventh-place effort. Krista Davidson also was in the top 10 with a 10th place finish. Lisa Zoppas (20th), Anna Petrill (24th), Tricia Pollard (33rd) and Christine Gaspar (34th) rounded out the Bishop Reding field who ran the three-kilometre event.

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
