

United Way campaign

Payroll deductions could top \$75,000

Slowly but surely donations are coming in to the United Way of Halton Hills. To date \$15,000 has been contributed but that is not a true gauge of how the campaign is going. In fact the final campaign total probably won't be known until the end of the year when all of the businesses handling payroll deductions for their workers who live in Halton Hills submit their figures.

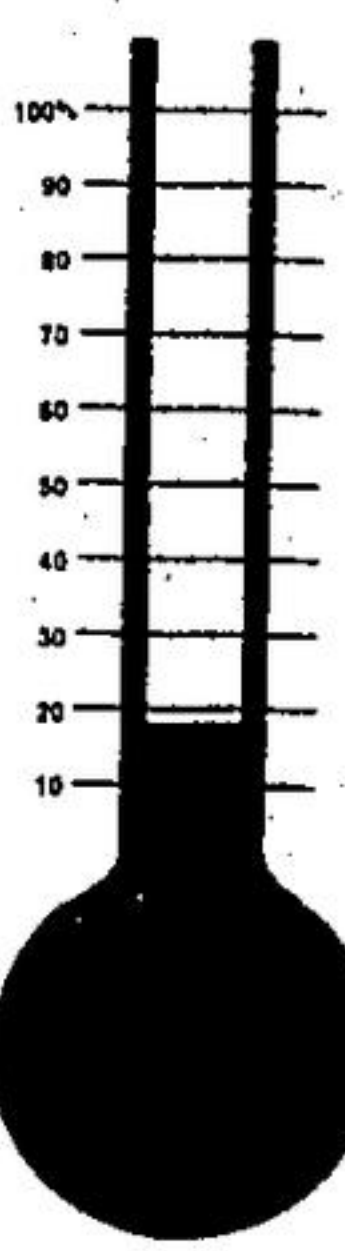
Studies indicate some \$50,000 to \$75,000 is being donated through payroll deductions by people who live in Halton Hills - this money can now be re-directed back to our community to help fund all of the programs of the 17 member agencies which make up the United Way of Halton Hills.

Also to be added in to the campaign total is all of the money contributed through the door-to-door canvassing. There are close to six hundred United Way volunteers working on the residential campaign. Each is responsible for canvassing about 15 homes. To date, the feedback from canvassers has been good - almost all households are aware of the inaugural campaign of the United Way in Halton Hills - and many have been generous. The residential campaign runs until Oct. 31 so if no one has come to your door yet - they will before the end of the month.

While the door-to-door campaign of all homes in Halton Hills is underway there is also a campaign to reach each and every business. Firms are making corporate donations, they are setting up payroll deduction plans for their workers and in some instances are challenging their business competitors to match their donation.

Additional donations to the United Way are coming from the special events planned during campaign month. Events like the kick-off lunch, the volleyball tournament, the dance at the Georgetown high school and the Regional Chairman's Ball Nov. 1. With each event the profile of the United Way of Halton Hills increases - as well as the campaign total.

This year's campaign goal is \$87,500 - money that will be divided among the member agencies to help fund new and existing programs. With the community's help and a lot of hard work by United Way volunteers, the goal will be reached and the first United Way campaign in Halton Hills will be a success.



As of Oct. 27, more than \$15,000 has been received in pledges from the United Way of Halton Hills. There's still lots more to come, because canvassers and firms initiating payroll deductions haven't all reported in yet. The campaign goal is \$87,000. The campaign has reached 17 per cent of its goal, as outlined on the thermometer above.

3 car accident

\$6,000 damage

A Norval driver turned in the path of a Georgetown driver Friday at 9:05 a.m. and caused an estimated \$6,000 in damage. The Norval man was northbound on Winston Churchill Boulevard at 50 kilometres per hour, police said. He was slowing down to turn into a private parking lot when he hit a southbound car. The Norval man was charged with failing to yield the right of way.

A 22-year-old Acton man was charged with impaired driving after he was stopped for speeding Oct. 22 at 11:45 p.m. on Ransom Street in Acton. He will appear in court Nov. 24.

For driving erratically an 18-year-old Georgetown woman was stopped and found to be impaired. She was stopped on Guelph Street at 12:15 a.m. Friday and will appear in court Dec. 1.

A 20-year-old Georgetown man will appear in court Dec. 1 for impaired driving Friday. He was stopped at 12:45 a.m. at Campbell Gate at Mountainview Road in Georgetown.

After being involved in an accident on Sideroad 5 west of Trafalgar Road a 36-year-old Toronto man was charged with impaired driving. He will appear in court Nov. 24. He was stopped Oct. 19 at 10:45 p.m.

Window smashed

The front door of Georgetown's Park Public School was smashed over Saturday night by someone throwing stones. Damage to the window in the door was \$300.

Car vandals

Obscenities were written with a marker, and a mirror and wipers were bent on a car parked at 62 Park Avenue in Georgetown between 8 p.m. Friday and 7:30 a.m. Saturday. Damage was estimated at \$1,200.

Car burglars

A 17-year-old Georgetown youth was arrested for two thefts from autos which occurred this summer. He was arrested Oct. 17 for Aug. 15 and June 29 thefts.

On Aug. 15 a vehicle parked on Ontario Street had \$320 in goods stolen from it, including binoculars and cassette tapes. June 29 a vehicle parked on Elana Court in Georgetown had \$150 in cash taken from it.

An unlocked car parked at 62 Park Ave. in Georgetown had cassette tapes, sun glasses and \$10 in Canadian Tire money stolen from it Friday night. The items were worth an estimated \$100.

House thieves

Police suspect thieves entered an RR5 Georgetown home through an unlocked window between 9:30 a.m. and 9:30 p.m. Oct. 22. A radio worth \$150, a carton of cigarettes and \$30 in change were stolen from the home.

Police assaulted

A 25-year-old Acton man was arrested for assaulting a police officer, being drunk in a public place and mischief to private property. He was charged Thursday at 10:20 p.m. at Mill Street and Main Street in Acton. He caused \$150 damage to a police car.

Saturday at 1:50 a.m. a man was arrested at Mill Street and Main Street for causing a disturbance and assaulting a police officer. He also kicked the rear window out of a police car. The 20-year-old Acton man kicked and spit at police.
