Rural land use decisions total 134

Halton Region's Land Division Committee has made 134 decisions between Jan. 1 to June 31 this year. Only nine of them were decisions that Regional planning staff felt didn't reflect Halton's policies. All except one had to do with land use in the rural area.

The committee had some problems when a decision had to be made where the Niagara Escarpment Plan differed with the Region's Official Plan.

Planning Director Rash Mohammed says conflicts between the two Plans are being worked out, with the Regional Plan expected to be brought into conformity with the Niagara Escarpment Plan this year.

Burlington Coun. Joan Little said she was concerned the Regional Plan wasn't given enough importance on rural applications and sometimes was outright disregarded.

Halton Hills Coun. Pam Sheldon urged committee members to defer an application for further study rather than denying it or approving it without enough information.

"I think that we make darn good decisions," committee member Stella Parton of Milton said. "The ones that I had real problems with and I thought we would be raked over the coals for, weren't even mentioned."

The number of decisions made during this six month period is up 34 per cent over the last six months. In July to December 1985, the committee made 99 decisions.

Burying heads in the sand

The agricultural community is putting their heads in the sand when it comes to the Regional landfill, warned Burlington Coun. Pat McLaughlin.

"By not commenting, they're hoping it will go away and get lost," Coun. McLaughlin said. "They're making a big mistake."

The councillor said he was disappointed the Halton Agricultural Advisory Committee made no constructive comments on an "After-Use" report on the proposed landfill site D in Milton.

Instead, HAAC merely passed a motion that it supports the selection of Site F in Burlington as the new landfill site.

According to the minutes of HAAC's Oct. 7 meeting, there was concern expressed that the high cost for rehabilitation to agriculture for Site F could make it appear that Site D was preferable. The Burlington site is poor agricultural land to begin with.

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Landlords get special grant

If you own an apartment building built before 1960 with a minimum of two self-contained rental units, and the building is less than five storeys tall, then you should get in touch with the town's treasurer.

Monday night, Ray King told councillors about a low rise rehabilitation program of the provincial government and got their support to apply for it.

The town is to apply to the Ministry of Housing for repair and renovation funding of 50 units. If the town meets the provincial criteria and gets accepted into the program, it will be publicizing the program in The Herald and processing applications on the basis of first come, first serve.

The program provides up to \$5,000 per unit to rehabilitate older low rise rental units to current property standards. Only repairs and rehabilitation required to bring the building and the units up to these standards are eligible for provincial funding.

Co-operatives, non-profits and owner-occupied duplexes and triplexes aren't eligible at this time.
