## Volleyball Rebels finish undefeated

The Georgetown District High School senior boys volleyball team has completed its East Halton season with an unblemished record.

The Rebels notched their eighth straight win Wednesday with a three-game sweep of Loyola at the Georgetown gym. As a result of their undefeated season, Georgetown finishes the season in top spot of the East Halton standings.

Rebels' coach Grant Clatworthy said the key to his club's winning season has been its ability to play good volleyball on a consistent basis. However Clatworthy's troops will be out to maintain that consistency when they took part in a tournament last weekend at North Park. A number of the province's top clubs attended. In addition the Rebels will take part in a tournament Saturday in Martingrove.

"The timing (for tournaments) is excellent," Clatworthy said. "We'll get through the tournaments and go to the playoffs and should be peaking at the right time."

The playoffs won't begin until Monday, and by virtue of finishing in top spot the Rebels will be at home for all games with the possible exception of the Halton final. The final site changes annually and if the top team in the West Division makes it to the championship Georgetown (should the Rebels too advance) will be on the road for the title. Last year Georgetown hosted the championship.

Clatworthy has been quite pleased with his bench strength this year. A number of players have been coming on as of late. "Ken Langdon is picking up some good skills and Pierre Chaisson is coming on. We've got a pretty good balanced team," he said.

While doing well in the playoffs is the Rebels' goal, the item in the back of the players' minds is the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Association (OFSAA) "AA"

playdowns. With five starters from last year's team that went to OFSAA, Georgetown's chances look good.

"If we don't do it this time we won't do it for another year or two," Clatworthy said.

Meanwhile the junior Rebels too are enjoying an undefeated season. With one game left (which was Monday at Bishop Reding), the Rebels are 8-0 and in top spot in the East Halton standings. Georgetown notched its latest win Wednesday beating Loyola 2-1 (15-3, 8-15, 15-3) at the Georgetown gym.

Coach Bob McKay started his first group in the initial game, then subed in his second-line troops for Game Two. In the deciding contest McKay went back to his starters for the win.

"It was good that we got our subs into a key game," McKay said. "It's the first game they've played that counted. They're coming."

The latest win was important for the Rebels as it guaranteed the locals home-court advantage throughout the playoffs.

McKay is cautiously optimistic about his club's chances of repeating as Halton champs. Friday the junior went up against the senior Rebels (who were minus Jon Hammer and Graham Shepherd) in a practice scrimmage and did quite well.

"If there's complacency I don't see it," McKay said. "There's just something about this group that they can rise to the occasion and hopefully it will happen in the playoffs."

With the regular season finished now, McKay said his team is looking towards successfully defending its Halton crown.

"With only two starters back from last year we've had to work hard to get where we are now," he said. "But the boys really want to take a shot (at defending their title)."

"They are a closely-knit group," McKay continued. "And a major reason for their advancement was the job done by Al Petherick when they were at Centennial Middle School."

## Title proves elusive

The Georgetown District High School senior boys volleyball team made it to the finals of the North Park tournament held this weekend before bowing out.

The Rebels met up with Don Boscoe in the championship and took the first game 15-4. However, the Rebels lost the second contest 15-3 and dropped the deciding contest 15-8. It was the second meeting for the two. In the North York tourney Georgetown was able to beat Don Boscoe.

The Rebels went undefeated in pool play, defeating Eastern Commerce, Grantham, J.A. Turner and Bramalea all by 2-0 scores. Georgetown won the coin toss and was able to skip the quarterfinal round. In the semis Georgetown defeated Mayfield 2-0 (15-13, 15-4) but Clatworthy had praise for his opponents.

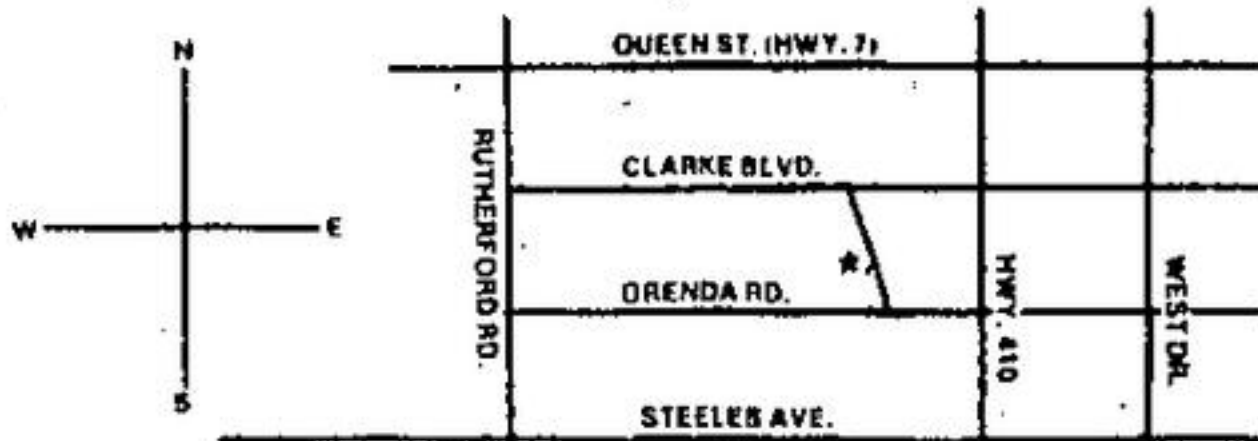
