Jr. Rebels claim victory in first playoff hoop game

Even some divine intervention wasn't enough for Perdue in their junior girls playoff game against Georgetown District High School Rebels Monday.

Perdue had a number of "Hall Mary" prayer shots answered in a positive way, but still went down to defeat at the hands of the Rebels 51-34 in a Halton playoff game played at the Georgetown gym. Still,

after having seen his team get a taste of the type of unpredictability that's possible in the playoffs Rebels' coach Moe Leeking is concerned about defending last year's Halton title.

"I'm so concerned I can taste it," Leeking said after the game. "Sometimes even hard work can't overcome the ups and downs. That's what scares me about junior basket-

ball." Perdue came out well in the first quarter and went ahead early before the Rebels took a 15-14 advantage into the second period. Georgetown opened the game up some in that frame, and led 29-20 at the half. The Rebels added two more points to their advantage after the third quarter, then added another six points to the lead.

Georgetown's defence was particularly awesome in the game Monday. In total the Rebels recorded three turnovers on time violations on in-bound passes and had two turnovers via five second time violations on the court itself. Leeking too was pleased with his team's defence.

Leeking was also pleased with the way his troops worked the ball against Perdue's zone defence.

"We had a good mix," he said. "We didn't rely on just one thing."

Guard Tara Burroughs had a good two-way game for the Rebels with 19 points offensively and numerous steals defensively. Heather Lawrence also had 11 points for the Rebels.

Monday's game was a loosely-called one, which earned Leeking a technical foul when he asked an official to watch out for physical play on one of his players.

The win advances Georgetown to the Halton semi final contest against M.M. Robinson. The game will be played today at the Georgetown gym. Leeking expects a tough game.

"M.M. is physical and they'll have something up their sleeve because they've seen us before," Leeking said.

The Rebels defeated Milton Mustangs 39-17 last week in the final East Halton regular season game for the local team. The win gave Georgetown top spot in the East Halton standings as the Rebels finished with an 8-1 record for the second straight year. Heather Lawrence had 10 points for Georgetown while Lisa Carter had nine points and Tara Burroughs had seven.

competition in the Division II championship with a 4-2 win over Grimsby Peach Kings. In the Division II consolation final Burlington Old Blades earned the title with a 4-1 win over West Mall Slow Pokes.

In Division III action TNT earned the Gold Medal honor with a 4-0 win over Brampton Looking Back. AMC captured the silver medal final with a 3-1 win over Waterloo Stumblers. In the bronze medal contest Hamilton Old Squeakers edged Halton Hills Huff 'N Puffers by a 2-1 score.

In all three local teams took part in the tournament, Georgetown Beaver Lumber was 1-1 in Division I play and made it to the consolation final against Kitchener-Waterloo Saints, where the locals claimed the title win. Georgetown Sunday Nighters were undefeated in their Division IIIA pool with a 2-0 record. However the Georgetown team was eliminated from championship play by TNT, who went on to win the Divi-

sion title. The other local team, Acton's Halton Hills Huff 'N Puffers were 0-1 in pool play and made it to the bronze medal game before being edged 2-1 by Hamilton Old Squeakers.

A total of about 12 individuals worked tirelessly to put the tournament on the weekend.
