Uncollected tax

The bid by a Streetsville man for the Silvercreek Parkette was turned down by town council Monday

Instead, councillors voted to put the parkette at Lot 27 Con. 7 on the open market.

Fred Hachman of RR2 Streetsville had made a bid for \$150,000 for the four lots on the property.

\$3,200 membership

Halton Region has decided to spend \$21;159 to buy a membership into the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

The 1987 conference of the organization is to be held in Ottawa and to cost \$5,300 per person.

Coun. Norman Elliott questioned

the value of belonging to this group, figuring out it would cost Halton Hills \$3,200 to belong.

Mayor Russ Miller said Burlington has belonged for some time and highly commends it.

Understocked libraries aren't matching demand

About \$700,000 is needed for Halton Hills Public Libraries to have as many books as other towns the same size. Ontario libraries in towns with 30,000 and 50,000 people have an average of 2.69 items per person, said Betsy Cornwell, chief librarian. Examples of items are books, records and tapes.

The average number of items in Halton Hills is 1 item less than the provincial average. "We've got a problem," said Mrs. Cornwell.

The item shortage and the 1987 library budget were discussed at the Nov. 13 Library Board meeting. Possible solutions to the item shortage will be discussed at the Dec. 17 Board meeting.

The problem, as identified by Mrs. Cornwell, is budgeting. "Instead of a goal driven budget, it is a percentage driven budget," she said of the town budget.

SPORTSWEAR

The budget keeps up with inflation, not the needs of the library. In the 12 years Mrs. Cornwell has been chief librarian, the budget has never concentrated on growth, she said. Now the number of items in Halton

Hills' libraries "is the lowest per capita in the province" in their town size range, she said. In order to catch up, a long term plan must be created. Mrs. Cornwell suggested a five year plan. "The

The library's budget for 1987 must be submitted by Jan. 9, 1987.

Library Board and the town have to

close the gap," Mrs. Cornwell said.

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


