# Georgetown native gets a new lease on pro soccer life

Herald Sports Editor Gary Morrow's dream of playing professional soccer has finally come true.

The 21-year-old has been put on the protected list by Hamilton Steelers of the newly-formed Canadian Soccer League. The eight-team pro circuit will begin its initial

season this coming June. This will mark the third time Morrow has had a shot at playing at a pro level. Two years ago the Georgetown native was a first-draft pick of the North American Soccer League's (NASL) Toronto Blizzard. However Morrow had little chance at playing for Toronto as a year after he was drafted the league folded. Morrow's first chance came in 1980 when at age 15, he made England's Chelsea club but came home for

academic reasons. But Morrow continued playing soccer. Prior to being drafted Morrow joined the national Youth team which qualified for the youth World Cup in 1984. Last year Morrow was a member of the Ontario soccer team which took part in the Canada Summer Games (and even scored a goal on national television) and also played for the Toronto and District League's Burlington United squad.

This summer Morrow joined Hamilton Steelers of the On-

tario Inter-City Soccer League (OICSL) and helped the team take the OICSL Challenge Cup and Ontario Cup. But the biggest accomplishment of the year was the Steelers' winning of the Air Canada Challenge Cup, which is symbolic of the Canadian champlonship. Hamilton defeated two-time winner Vancouver Croatia 1-0 in the final which was played last month in Sherbrooke, Quebec.

Morrow is elated at getting a second chance at a procareer. With a salary celling in effect (at around \$50,000), Morrow is confident the CSL will be able to function well and survive.

"I'm really looking forward to it (upcoming season)," Morrow said from his home last week. "I've experienced a lot tetdowns in the past but this is a real break-through. This (playing professional soccer) has been in me all my life. All that training has finally paid off."

One thing Morrow has to do in the near future is negotiate a contract with Hamilton. The 6'1, 185-pound centre-halfback plans to have his grandfather represent him in the negotiations and doesn't expect much trouble with the talks.

"I think they're content to have me play," he said. "They

sure seem interested. I should be able to make a living at it." Morrow's soccer exploits in the new league won't be confin-

ed to just Ontario. The CSL has teams from Toronto, Ottawa,

North York, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton and Winnipegwith another possible franchise out of Montreal. The four Ontario teams will comprise an East Division with the other clubs playing in the West Division. Teams will play a 16game schedule, with divisional rivals facing each other four times. Hamilton will play each West Division squad once.

With Canada's good showing at last year's World Cup, the league is hoping soccer will continue gaining momentum in this country. To ensure the CSL's survival the salary ceiling has been adopted and season ticket prices have been made quite affordable. In Hamilton's case adults will be charged \$70 while seniors and children under 16 will pay \$30.

Morrow won't begin training as a pro until after Christmas. Presently Morrow is making trips to Hamilton and Ancaster to train and also play in an indoor league. In addition Morrow will begin training with the Canadian Olympic team early next month and is setting his sights on the 1988 Summer Games which will be held in Seoul, Korea. Although Morrow will be deemed a professional athlete when the Games are held, he will still be allowed to take part because professional athletes will be accepted in the soccer ranks at that time.

"I think the league (CSL) will go because of the salary ceiling," Morrow said. "I'll be nervous at the start, which is to be expected. But once I get settled in I'll be alright."
